

WOMAN MURDERED IN CHICAGO STREETS

Mrs. E. S. Mize Shot Down While
Taking an Evening Walk in a
Fashionable Quarter.

ROBBER DEMANDED HER MONEY

She Resisted, Vigorously Attacking
Him—People Everywhere, but Cries
For Help Brought No Aid.

Chicago, Aug. 22.—Mrs. E. S. Mize of New York city was murdered tonight by a robber while taking an evening walk in one of the fashionable residence districts on the south side.

For the greater part of the summer Mrs. Mize had been a guest at the Del Prado hotel, which fronts on the Midway Plaisance. Tonight, in company with Mrs. K. F. Wilson of Los Angeles, Mex., also a guest at the hotel, she went out for a short walk.

They had reached the corner of Fifty-ninth street and Washington avenue, two squares from the hotel, when they were confronted by a man, who demanded their money and valuables. All along Fifty-ninth street and on Washington avenue people were sitting upon their porches and balconies, and many of them, who were looking on, saw the robbery, but no one came to the aid of the victim.

Mrs. Mize was able to utter but two cries for aid when the robber shot her through the heart, killing her instantly. Mrs. Wilson, who was looking back at the time, fell in a faint, and when the residents of the neighborhood came running in response to the calls of Mrs. Mize, they found both women lying upon the sidewalk.

Mrs. Wilson, still unconscious, was taken to the Del Prado hotel, while the body of Mrs. Mize was carried by the police to an undertaking establishment near at hand.

The murderer, after shooting Mrs. Mize, fled into an alley between Fifty-ninth and Sixty-first streets and disappeared in the darkness. He was seen by nobody except Mrs. Mize, Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. Martha Scanlon, a guest of the Del Prado hotel, who, hearing the shot, looked hastily out of the window and saw the man running into the alley. She was not able to describe him, and Mrs. Wilson was so utterly prostrated that she could not give to the police any details of his appearance. A swarm of detectives and uniformed policemen were on the ground within a few minutes, but for the time being at least the murderer made good his escape, without leaving a tangible clue.

THE DOUMA DISCUSSED

At Public Meeting in Town Hall
Of Moscow.

Moscow, Aug. 22.—At a public meeting in the town hall today the emperor's manifesto on the Douma project was discussed. One speaker denounced the manifesto and the project in violent terms and urged armed rebellion.

Later the municipal officials entered the hall, and the mayor, Prince Galitzin, made a speech, after which a resolution was adopted, which declared that the meeting attached great value to the constitution of the Douma, as the first step toward participation of the public in the work of legislation, but it fully realized that a national government was possible only on the condition that the Russian people be given immediately all civil rights, freedom of the press, freedom of speech and meeting and inviolability of person, and urged that changes be made based on the principle of universal suffrage in order to restore the complete calm of the country.

The action of the meeting was greeted with applause. There were few dissenters.

Rescued by Life-Savers.

New York, Aug. 22.—The three-masted schooner Marion E. Rockhill, bound from Southamptown, N. Y., for Danvers, Port, Mass., went ashore near Amagansett Bay, Long Island, today, and her crew of five men were rescued by life-savers from Amagansett station.

Y. M. C. A. Man Dead.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 22.—Lester McLean, formerly assistant secretary of the international committee in the Bible study department of the Y. M. C. A., traveling among the colleges of the United States, died tonight from typhoid fever, after a month's illness. Three hours after his death his family received news of his appointment to a fellowship in the Imperial university at Tokyo, Japan.

SWINDLERS ARRESTED.

Man and Woman Perpetrators
Many Real Estate Swindles.

New York, Aug. 22.—In the arrest last night of Carl H. Hoffman and his wife Elizabeth, a handsome girl of about 18 years, the police assert they captured the perpetrators of real estate swindles in the Bronx amounting to thousands of dollars. The Hoffmans claim Los Angeles, Cal., as their home. Circumstances are alleged to have been sent all over the country recently by a detective agency seeking to arrest the couple.

According to the detective Hoffman called at the office of a real estate broker last Friday and tried to make a deal for a house in the Bronx for which he claimed to have a buyer. At a later meeting for transferring the property the agent alleges that Hoffman handed over to him the bargain a check for

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It is worth noting that the Bridgeport National bank of Connecticut, which was recently reported as having been "sunk" by the "Sah" and apparently "properly certified," the agent then handed Hoffman a \$500 check as his commission. This was soon deposited by Mrs. Hoffman who drew against it for \$150. When the real estate agent took the \$2000 check to the bank, however, it was learned, so the charge, that no certification of this paper had been made by the Bridgeport bank. The police were at once called in and succeeded in capturing the Hoffmans a few hours later.

Successful Airship Flight.

Portland, Or., Aug. 22.—One of the most successful airship flights in the history of aerial navigation was made at the Lewis & Clark exposition yesterday when the "City of Portland" was up for its second trip. The vessel was in the air for half an hour, during which time it covered six miles of territory without a hitch of any kind, finally landing safely in exactly the same spot from whence it ascended. In making an exhibition stop to test the speed of the craft a distance of one-half mile was covered in a minute and 15 seconds. This is the fastest time ever recorded as having been made by an airship.

Association of Manufacturers.

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 22.—Twenty-one prominent manufacturers from different parts of the country are named as members of the National Association of Manufacturers of the United States, which was incorporated here for the purpose of regulating relations between employers and employees and dealing with labor unions.

The certificate states that the organization is formed for the betterment of relations between employer and employee, the protection of the individual liberty and rights of employer and employee, the education of the public in the principles of individual liberty and ownership of property, the support of legislation in furtherance of those principles and opposition to legislation in derogation thereof, also to secure freedom from "unlawful and unjust exactions."

The principal office is in New York. Among the directors is D. M. Parry, Indianapolis.

Warsaw Strike Situation.

Warsaw, Aug. 22.—Owing to the strong military measures adopted the strike will not become absolutely general. Many shops are open and only a few banks, insurance companies and commercial offices are closed. Still the situation is serious. Practically all the factories at Warsaw and Lodz are closed.

Serious rioting has occurred at the latter place, the strikers forcing the shops to close by smashing the windows. The strike on the state railways and trams continues, and telegraph communication between Lodz and Warsaw is discontinued. The newspapers are not appearing at Lodz.

Alleged Cure for Leprosy Found.

Manila, Aug. 22.—What appears to be a well-authenticated instance of the cure of leprosy has been found here. A few weeks ago a patient who had been afflicted with leprosy, and who had been under treatment for that disease, died of liver complaint. After the patient's death every part of his body was subjected to a searching microscopic examination by bacteriologists, but not the slightest trace of leprosy could be found.

Dr. H. B. Wilkinson is the physician who treated the patient for leprosy. He is a graduate of the University of Virginia, class of 1894.

SWEDEN AND NORWAY.

Broad Lines of Settlement of Differences About Reached.

Stockholm, Aug. 22.—The members of the cabinet are not willing to express an opinion until the full report of the action of the working is received. A prominent member, however, said to the Associated Press today:

"It appears that the working's decision embraces the approval of the primary principles on which the riksdag founded its action. We understand that the working's decision coincides with the view held by the riksdag that negotiations on the principal conditions shall precede the riksdag's consent to a dissolution of the union and cancellation of the riksdag. The broad lines of settlement once reached, however, there is every reason to hope for a satisfactory solution of the question."

CONGER TENDERS HIS RESIGNATION.

Private Business and Personal
Affairs Prompt Course of the
Ambassador to Mexico.

HE WILL NOT BE SENT TO CHINA

President Expresses Appreciation of
His Services Both in Flowery
Kingdom and Brazil.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 22.—Edwin H. Conger of Iowa has resigned his post as ambassador to Mexico, to take effect Oct. 1, next, and President Roosevelt has accepted the resignation.

Mr. Conger's retirement from the diplomatic service was foreshadowed in these dispatches last week. It was disclosed then that he might be sent to China as a special commissioner of the president to adjust, if possible, the differences which have arisen between this country and China over the boycott of American goods by some of the Chinese commercial guilds.

While no official statement is obtainable here regarding the mission, there are reasons for the statement that it either has been abandoned by the president or that it has been declined by Mr. Conger. At any rate, it is believed Mr. Conger will not go to China as a representative of the government.

It has not been determined definitely yet who will succeed Mr. Conger as ambassador to Mexico, but a few days ago it was reported that David E. Thompson of Nebraska, now American ambassador to Brazil. It is known that Ambassador Thompson desires the Mexico post.

In connection with the appointment of Francis B. Loomis, assistant secretary of state, has been mentioned, but it can be said pretty definitely that Mr. Loomis will not be appointed. His resignation as assistant secretary of state may be expected at any time. It is certain that he is to retire from the state department, but whether he will receive an appointment in the diplomatic service, as has been suggested, is thought to be somewhat problematical.

The president tonight authorized the publication of the correspondence which passed between him and Ambassador Conger with regard to the latter's resignation. The letters follow:

Washington, D. C., 18, 1905.—The president: For reasons pertaining to my private business and personal affairs, I have the honor to tender, herewith, my resignation as ambassador to Mexico, to take effect on Oct. 1, 1905, at such date as will suit your convenience.

"It is with feelings of regret that I leave a service the duties of which I have found so interesting and in which I have received so many evidences of your confidence, and such inviolable cordials and kindness at your hands, and which I shall always cherish as most valuable and pleasant recollections, for all of which I thank you, Mr. President, with all my heart, and I have the honor to remain, your obedient servant."

"E. H. CONGER."

Oyster Bay, Aug. 19, 1905. Mr. Dear Mr. Conger:—I have received your resignation, to take effect Oct. 1, 1905, and accept it with regret. In thus accepting it I desire to express to you my cordial appreciation of the work that you have performed in China, as previously in Brazil, and in the embassy duty you have been the chief of official of whom Americans have a right to feel proud. I am sure that your services to our country have been of great value.

AFLOAT ON LAKE MICHIGAN.

Couple Rescued After Being Out
Two Days in Row Boat.

Chicago, Aug. 22.—After being afloat on Lake Michigan since Sunday evening in a small rowboat, John Chartres and Miss Beulah Stewart of Evanston, Ill., were rescued over two days ago. Both of them were in a precarious condition because of exposure and lack of nourishment and sleep.

On Sunday afternoon Chartres called at the residence of Miss Stewart and asked her to go boat-riding on the lake. They rented a small skiff from a fisherman and rowed out into the lake. About two hours after they departed a small vessel over the lake, and when nothing was seen of the couple it was thought they had been blown out to sea. About two hours after they were picked up by some passing steamer. This afternoon, while the life-savers were on duty, they were rescued.

Chartres explained that during the equal one of his oars was broken and that, being unable to propel the boat after that he had drifted all his energy to keeping it afloat and out of the trough of the sea, which at times was exceedingly rough.

His strength was about gone when he and Miss Stewart were found, and he declared that he could not have held out for another night.

FATAL BENZINE EXPLOSION.

Dr. William Ringer of St. Louis
Killed by It.

Chicago, Aug. 22.—A dispatch to the Tribune from St. Louis, Mo., says: Dr. William Ringer, a member of the faculty of Marion-Sim Medical college, was killed by an explosion of benzine in the laboratory of his home yesterday.

The sacrifice of his life was indirectly due to his being in prosecuting a systematic study of the symptoms and causes of consumption.

He was cleaning the lens of his microscope by the use of a gas jet when the fumes of benzine which he was using as a cleaning agent became ignited, and the explosion followed. Dr. Ringer was sitting at his microscope and in the last six months had devoted much leisure to the study of consumption.

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CHARGES AGAINST DIRECTOR NEWELL

Land Com'r. Williams of Wash-
ington Declared that What He
Said Was Not Sound.

IRRIGATIONISTS HAVE HOT TIME

Wide Differences Developed Among
Them—Trouble Was Finally
Composed.

Portland, Or., Aug. 22.—The National Irrigation congress today considered subjects kindred to reclamation of arid lands, in sectional meetings.

There was an apparently wide difference of opinion between the officials of the reclamation service and the delegates on the effectuality of the present national law.

The resolutions committee, before whom the actual work of the congress is proceeding, emphatically set its feet down today on the foreign immigration resolution introduced at the general session yesterday by William Smythe of California. Judge J. E. Baker of California opposed the resolution on the ground that it was a move to inject a political issue into the proceedings of the congress. The subject has been disposed of temporarily.

Another resolution on which the committee sounded a death knell was one which favored amending the reclamation law in the interest of large landholders.

The resolutions committee had a strenuous session this evening which lasted late into the night. Little progress had been made today by the committee, not more than the first eight or 10 resolutions having been disposed of. The committee consumed one hour and a half tonight in considering a resolution providing for a commission which should sit at Washington and have general supervision of the reclamation service.

Director F. H. Newell of the reclamation service gave a detailed explanation of the procedure of the engineers in locating, letting contracts and completing a project.

When Director Newell left the room Judge Baker moved that the committee reject the resolution and substitute one endorsing the work of the reclamation officials.

The motion had been barely made when Land Commissioner Williams of the state of Washington charged that 90 per cent of what Mr. Newell had said regarding the conduct of the department at Washington was not sound, and instead of seeking to lessen "red tape," as Mr. Newell had asserted, Washington officials were attempting to do it.

Judge Baker entered the lists in behalf of Mr. Newell. He inquired why, if 90 per cent of what the director had said was a falsehood he had not been confronted with an accusation. Mr. Williams stated that Newell's statement that Newell himself sought to lessen "red tape," but that he was sick for over two days at Washington into whose hands the reclamation projects went after they left Director Newell's department. This matter was corroborated by the withdrawal of the original resolution.

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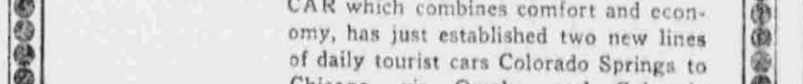
