## ICE FAMINE IN JUNCTION CITY

Mild Winter Necessitates Importation of Ice From Montana To Fill Local Demand.

## ANOTHER AZUSA DAMAGE SUIT

\$29,000 for the Life of Fireman Walter Comstock—Funeral of William Schear—News Briefs.

Ogden, March 7.—The shortage of ice in Ogden this year, caused through the extremely mild weather of the entire winter, is going to work a hardship on the people of this city. The ice-dealers have always been able to put up at least a half crop, but this year the ice houses are practically empty. The railroad companies have always harvested plenty of ice in Ogden to take care of the refrigerator cars and for all other purposes, but this year they have found it necessary to ship in their entire crop. The Union Pacific has its ice house practically filled from Evansville, Wyoming, and the Southern Pacific is shipping its ice from Montana points. Hereafter the S. P. has been able to get plenty of ice from Nevada, when there was a shortage here, but this season the weather was so mild in that district that little ice could be obtained, making it necessary to ship from such long distances. Ogden being the junction point for the railroad lines, committee of ice is used here. Several of the ice houses have been increased to double their former capacity so as to be able to take care of the business. Ice this year promises to be a scarce article and the price will be increased from \$2 per month to \$3 per month for 10 pounds daily for refrigerator purposes.

ed, killing several people, against the Union Pacific Railroad company. The damages asked for is \$20,000. All day yesterday was occupied in securing a jury to hear the case. The taking of testimony was commenced this morning. It is doubtful if the testimony can be completed this week. In one of the cases already tried a verdict of \$10,000 damages was rendered and in the other the jury brought in a verdict of no cause of action.

His Sunday school class marched ahead of the funeral cortege from the home to the church.

BECKWITHS HELD FOR TRIAL.

On Charge of Embezzlement—Section Men Cause Wreck.

## SPINAL MENINGITIS.

Medical Society Discusses Dread Disease and Its Treatment.

Provo, March 7.—The regular monthly meeting of the Utah County Medical society, was held yesterday in the Commercial club rooms, with a good attendance. The discussion of the meeting was directed to cerebro spinal meningitis, on which papers were presented by Doctors Charles T. Kendall of Spanish Fork and J. H. Slater of Provo, and comments were made from current literature by Dr. E. W. Taylor. Dr. Kendall's paper was in part as follows: Ions:

A great deal has been done of late to enable the practitioner to recognize the existence of meningitis and its various forms. The apparent symptoms, the fever, headache, delirium, retraction of the neck, tremor and rigidity of the muscles, are all present in nearly all cases. Aside from certain cases of typhoid and pneumonia, there is small likelihood of the practitioner mistaking his diagnosis." The remainder of the paper was devoted to a discussion of the professional nursing and treatment of cases, and the importance of hygienic and sanitary measures in combating the disease.

The diet should be nutritious, milk and broths while fever lasts. In cases difficult to feed, forced alimentation through stomach tube. Cases usually bear stimulants well; whiskey and brandy may be given freely when there are signs of falling heart. Lastly, the patient should be isolated as much as possible, in a room that is free from noise and not too much light.

A general discussion followed, and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this society that the present epidemic of cerebro spinal meningitis is not caused by any condition special to this county. That it is mildly epidemic and infectious, and therefore calls for care and cleanliness, together with sanitary and hygienic measures on the part of all. That all local authorities be urged to carry out these measures forthwith. And that public gatherings, beyond the over exertion and fatigue necessarily produced by carrying of amusements to the extreme, are not a source of danger. That the public avoid fear above other things."
