BUT GET AN INCREASE OF PAY Agreement Effective From April 1-No Reduction of Crews or Increased Milcage to Offset Grants. Chicago, April 4 .- The differences be tween the western railroads and the nembers of the order of Conductors and of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen were finally adjusted today. The

men abandoned their demand for a nine-hour workday, and the railroads made an advance over their previous propositions in the pay of baggagemen, fagmen and brakemen of \$1.59 per month. The original deminds of the men were for an increase of 12 per cent and for a working day of nine hours. The managers offered an increase in pay of 10 per cent and declined to grant the nine-hour day. The agreement was reached mainly through the efforts of Chairman Knapp of the interstate commerce commission and Chairman Neill of the United States labor commission. The new agreement, which goes into effect dating from April , follows: The pay of conductors in the passen-ger service to be increased \$10 per month, that of baggagemen, \$7.59, and that of flagmen and brakemen, \$6.59 per month, as applied to the schedules in effect Nov. 1, 1906. The railroads are not to make any reduction in crews or increase in milemade an advance over their previous

reduction in crews or increase in mile-age for the purpose of offsetting the increased wages given the passenger trainmen

trainmen. Overtime in the passenger service to be allowed on the basis of 15 miles per hour, to be computed for each part of the run separately. Time is to begin at the schedule time of leaving. Roads on a basis of more than 10 hours per day for a helper, or construc-tion train service, are to make no in-crease in the rates paid for such serv-ice.

ice. The increases granted in the agree-ment are to apply also to rates for spe-cial services, as specified in the indi-vidual schedule. Upon roads having a better basis for a day's work, or for payment of over-time or other allowances, in all branches of train service, the accept-ance of this agreement is not to act as a reduction.

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Fire-men were also granted today, by the railroads, an increase of 10 per cent.

B. M. HOLBROOK INDICTED.

President of Wyo. Coal Co. Charged With Conspiracy to Defraud.

With Conspiracy to Defraud. Cheyenne, Wyo., April 4.—It has been learned here today that the spe-elal federal grand jury, called at the request of Asst. U. S. Atty, Genburch, returned five indictinents last evening against B. M. Holbrook, president of the Wyoming Coal Mining company, which owns the Monarch and other mines in Sheridan county, Wyo.; E. T. McCarthy, a former business associate of Holbrook; E. E. Lonabaugh, a Sheridan attorney, and Robert Mc-Philamey, a real estate dealer of Sheridan.

Philamoy, a real estate dealer of Sheridan. The indictments charge conspiracy with intent to defraud the government Holbrook and McCarthy are reputed to be millionaires. McCarthy is en-gaged in zinc and lead mining enter-reises in Missouri. Lonabaugh and McPhilamey are charged with taking vo coal lands and selling them to the company. They are now in this city, and have been held in \$5,000 bonds. The other two men have not been ap-prehended. prehended.
