

BOTH SIDES MADE SOME CONCESSIONS

Conductors and Trainmen Abandon Their Demand for a Nine-Hour Day.

BUT GET AN INCREASE OF PAY.

Agreement Effective From April 1—No Reduction of Crews or Increased Mileage to Offset Grants.

Chicago, April 4.—The differences between the western railroads and the members of the order of Conductors and of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen were finally adjusted today. The men abandoned their demand for a nine-hour workday, and the railroads made an advance over their previous propositions in the pay of baggage men, flagmen and brakemen of \$1.50 per month. The original demands of the men were for an increase of 12 per cent and for a working day of nine hours. The managers offered an increase in pay of 10 per cent and declined to grant the nine-hour day.

The agreement was reached mainly through the efforts of Charles Knapp, of the interstate commerce commission and Chairman Neil of the United States labor commission.

The new agreement, which goes into effect dating from April 1, follows: The pay of conductors in the passenger service to be increased \$10 per month; that of baggage men, \$1.50; and that of flagmen and brakemen, \$1.50 per month, as applied to the schedules in effect Nov. 1, 1906.

The railroads are not to make any reduction in crews or to increase mileage for the purpose of offsetting the increased wages given the passenger trainmen.

Over time in the passenger service to be allowed on the basis of 15 miles per hour, to be computed for each part of the run separately. Time is to begin at the schedule time of leaving the station on a basis of more than 10 hours per day for a helper, or construction train service, are to make no increase in the rates paid for such service.

The increases granted in the agreement are to apply also to rates for special services, as specified in the individual schedule.

Upon roads having a better basis for a day's work, or for payment of overtime or other allowances, in all branches of train service, the acceptance of this agreement is not to act as a reduction.

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen were also granted by the railroads, an increase of 10 per cent.

THIRTY-FIVE FIREMEN HURT BY FALLING DEBRIS.

New York, April 4.—Thirty firemen, among them Chief Crocker and Deputy Chief Guelin, were hurt by falling debris, and damage estimated at \$50,000 was caused by a fire in the five-story building at 19 Madison lane early today. Only two of the men were severely injured—Andrew Swert, assistant foreman, and David Murphy, fireman. Nearly a hundred firemen were at work on the burning building when an explosion ripped off the roof, tore out the front wall of the building from the fourth story up, and shook portions of two other walls down in the street. At the sound of the explosion the firemen fled, but 30 of them were caught in the falling debris. Most of the injured were treated in a temporary hospital established near the scene by ambulance surgeons and sent home on their own feet.

The burned building was occupied by William H. Schale & Co., dealers in guns and variegates.

B. M. HOLBROOK INDICTED.

President of Wyo. Coal Co. Charged With Conspiracy to Defraud.

Cheyenne, Wyo., April 4.—It has been learned here today that the special federal grand jury, called at the request of Asst. U. S. Atty. General, returned five indictments against B. M. Holbrook, president of the Wyoming Coal Mining company, which owns the Monarch and other mines in Sheridan county, Wyo.; E. T. McCarthy, a former business associate of Holbrook; E. E. Lombard, a Sheridan attorney, and Robert McPherson, a real estate dealer of Sheridan.

The indictments charge conspiracy with intent to defraud the government, Holbrook and McCarthy are reported to be millionaires. McCarthy is engaged in zinc and lead mining enterprises in Missouri, Louisiana and Michigan; he is charged with taking coal lands and selling them to the company. They are now in this city, and have been held in \$5,000 bonds. The other two men have not been apprehended.

The grand jury last week returned an indictment against W. F. Brittain, formerly postmaster of Sheridan. Charges have been made that Brittain burned official communications and other mail matter addressed to residents of Sheridan. Brittain was recommended for appointment as registrar of the land office at Buffalo, Wyo.

DEEP WATERWAYS MEN ARE HIGHLY ELATED.

Chicago, April 4.—Elated over what they were inclined to believe their first big victory, the board of governors of the Lakes and the Gulf Deepwaterways association, which met in Chicago yesterday, adopted a resolution thanking President Roosevelt for the creation of the inland waterways commission.

Fifteen members of the board, representing almost every state touched by the Mississippi river, attended the meeting at the auditorium annex in the afternoon and a banquet was tendered them by the Commercial association of Chicago at the Union League club last night.

RECEPTION TO GERMANS.

New York, April 4.—The German consul-general, Carl Buerz, gave a reception last night at the Deutscher Verein in honor of the six German delegates who are to inaugurate the Carnegie institute at Pittsburgh.

Among the speakers were Consul-General Buerz, who presided, and former German minister of commerce, Von Moeller, who spoke on the commercial interests of Germany and the United States and emphasized the necessity of a commercial understanding between the two countries as being in their own interest. He concluded by proposing a toast to the health of the president.

FROM. PREST. ZELAYA.

Reports About Occupation of Tegucigalpa by Nicaraguan Troops, False.

New York, April 4.—A dispatch received by the Associated Press from President Zelaya of Nicaragua, concerning reports that looting had been indulged in by the Nicaraguan and Honduran troops at the time of the capture of Tegucigalpa follows:

"Managua, Nicaragua, April 4.—Facts have demonstrated the falsity of the Salvadoran news. Reports about the occupation of Tegucigalpa by the Honduran army are infamous calumnies. The American charge d'affaires is bade to give testimony."

BUTTE MINERS AND MANAGERS HAVE AGREED.

Butte, Mont., April 4.—The concluding chapter in the negotiations incident to the settlement of all differences between the mining companies and the miners' union was written today in the office of John D. Ryan, managing director for the Amalgamated Copper company, when the members of the committee representing the employees and the acting heads of the companies, signed the five-year contract recently ratified by the union. Later in the day the contract between the Amalgamated Copper Mining company and the Mill and Smeltermen's union of Anaconda was signed, and it is announced that the remaining contracts between the companies and the other unions will be signed at noon meetings on Monday.

The contracts signed today went into effect April 1.

ANTI-ROOSEVELT COMBINE FORMED

Hearst, Harriman and Rockefeller Have a Five Million Dollar Fund for a Campaign.

SEEK TO DEFEAT HIS POLICIES

Part of Plan is to Secure Election of State Delegates to the National Convention.

Washington, April 4.—It was said on authority at the White House today that there is ample evidence at hand for the claim that the president holds that there is a movement afoot to defeat his policies in the next Congress and in the next convention. It is declared that the Hearst-Harriman-Rockefeller combine had already a fund of \$5,000,000 with which to carry on its campaign in opposition to the president. It was further authoritatively said:

"They are gathering up the loose ends, but the movement will flatten out. It is apparent in Ohio and Pennsylvania. In fact, it extends across the entire country. The scheme was thoroughly divulged at a recent dinner and reached the White House through a friend of the president. The scheme of the people behind the movement is to buy newspapers, public and others who may assist the opponents of the president in their work."

It was also stated authoritatively at the White House today that part of the president's policy is the election of state delegates to the national convention from those states known to favor the president, these delegates to be instructed for President Roosevelt, notwithstanding knowledge in advance that the president would not be a candidate for renomination. Then, according to the statement made, upon the president declining to be a candidate for renomination as he has said, he would decline, the delegates are to consider themselves free and are to switch over to some opponent of the president and the policies for which he is standing.

HARRIMAN WON'T TALK.

New York, April 4.—E. H. Harriman declines absolutely to talk about the report from Washington that Standard Oil and associated interests had raised a fund of \$5,000,000 to prevent the nomination for president of a man of President Roosevelt's choosing in 1908. The statement of Frank G. Barnston, a Standard Oil director, was:

"It is simply absurd; that's all I have to say."

Mr. Harriman had a talk late yesterday with H. H. Rogers of the Standard Oil company. He said at its conclusion that the talk was only about business matters which were not connected in any way with President Roosevelt.

COLD BLOODED MURDER.

Mo. Pacific Operator at Scott City, Kan., Shot by Unknown Parties.

Pueblo, Colo., April 4.—A special to the Christian from Scott City, Kan., says: Between 10 and 11 o'clock last night a shot rang out from the depot of the Missouri Pacific railroad and aroused the proprietor of the hotel nearby. Upon investigation it was found that Operator Kirsch had been murdered in a cold blooded way by some unknown persons. The body was found partly in the office and partly in the waiting room. The hotel man who discovered the body, at once notified the day agent and he came to the scene but no one could be found. The murder is thought that robbery was the motive but that the murderers were frightened away by the quick response to the shot.

JAMESTOWN REGATTA.

New York, April 4.—According to plans approved last night by the regatta committee of the Jamestown International rowing regatta, the regatta to be held at Jamestown Aug. 18 to 27, promises to eclipse any similar event ever had in the United States. The most important feature of the regatta will be the intercity contests. All crews will be entered from cities instead of clubs and each crewman competing in the regatta will be required to wear the coat of arms of the city he represents on his rowing jersey. The program will be continued to seven and possibly eight events. All races will be straightaway and the distance will be one and a quarter miles.

A VATICAN STATEMENT.

Relates to Controversy With France Over Montagnini's Letter.

Rome, April 4.—The vatican authorities today made a statement on the subject of the letter of State Secretary Merry del Val's letter to Mgr. Montagnini, dated Aug. 12, 1905, encouraging Catholic demonstrations against the law providing for the separation of church and state. The statement says the French government "took advantage of the letter to insinuate that the vatican was in correspondence contained documents showing the vatican had urged that tumultuous demonstrations against the law, and the taking of church inventories, especially by the anti-Republican parties."

The vatican statement concludes by asserting that the publication of the text of the letter, instead of injuring the holy see, shows more clearly how, in opposing the separation of church and state, they always strictly adhered to pacific legal methods.

WILLIAM D. HAYWOOD ISSUES A STATEMENT.

Denver, April 4.—A special to the News from Idaho, Idaho, contains a statement from William D. Haywood, secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, now in prison there in connection with the assassination of ex-Gov. Steunenberg, commenting upon certain references to him by President Roosevelt in letters to J. S. Sherman of New York, given publicity recently through the Roosevelt-Harriman episode. The statement reads:

"I do not desire to make an extended statement with regard to President Roosevelt's reference to me in his letter to Congressman Sherman."

"The president says that I am an 'undesirable citizen' and infers, being that as such, I should be put out of the way. His inference is all-powerful, and his statement, coming as it does, on the eve of my trial for my life, will work me irreparable injury, and do more to prevent a fair trial than everything that has been said and done against me in the past."

"President Roosevelt is the leading exponent of the doctrine of 'fair play' and a square deal; but his reference to me in his letter to Sherman demonstrates that he does not practice what he preaches."

MANIFESTOES IN PARIS.

Inquiry Into Authorship of Those Placarded to be Inquired Into.

Paris, April 4.—The cabinet has decided that the various ministers shall make inquiries regarding the authorship of the manifestoes that were placarded throughout the city last week vilifying the action of the government in refusing permission to the state employees to form trade unions and to dining or otherwise punish the employees involved.

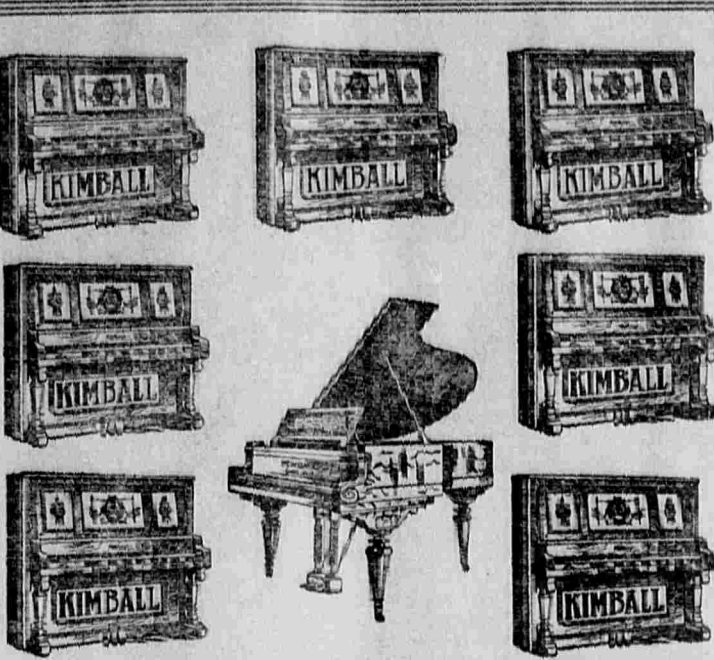
