

## BIKE RACES AT THE SAUCER TRACK.

Johanne Chapman Won the Five Mile Motor Paced Event.

THE ATTENDANCE WAS LARGE.

The First Event, a Mile Handicap Professional, Was Captured by Geo. Collet from Scratch.

A large and enthusiastic crowd assembled at the Salt Palace bicycle track last evening to watch the boys chase and tear around the saucer in pursuit of gold and silver, and it is safe to say that the fans were well pleased with the program furnished them by Manager Heagren. He seems to know just the kind of events to please the public, and the card he gave last night was the best.

The event of the evening was a five-mile motor-paced race, which was won by Johanne Chapman, much to the joy of those who favored the race. Billy Samuelson was a favorite, but he turned out to be a "hot" also. It was not his fault, however, as the motor giving him pace, rather than giving him pace, refused to perform its functions at the critical moment, thus placing him out of the running. Hardy Downing got second in the race. The latter's motor also acted contrary, while the Atlanta boy's machine kept up a steady gait. Once he secured the lead, there was a little danger of his being hauled in. He plugged steadily along at a lively clip, and raked in the big money.

The time for the race was 5:30.

The first event of the evening was a mile handicap for professionals, and Geo. Collet proved to be the fastest man in the race, although starting from scratch. He carried off the winner's end of the purse in the time of 1:52.5. Downing, second, and Stevens, 25 yards, third.

The amateurs put up a pretty race in the three-mile open lap race. Emil Araz and E. B. Heagren carried off first and second in this event. The distance was covered in 4:25. There was a great deal of jockeying for position and the winner could not be picked until he dashed over the tape. Following is how the race was won: Morgan, 2; Redman, 2; Araz, 1; Taylor, 4; Redman, 4; Weiser, 5; Tate, 7.

In the half-mile open consolation race for amateurs there were seven starters. Ever Redman took first in 1:03.5. The weather was beautiful for the occasion, the crowd was large and enthusiastic, and the race was "simply lovely."
