A Young Utah Sculptor.—C. E. Dallin, a young sculptor, of Springville, Utah, now studying in Boston, Mass., has just executed another creditable specimen of his artistic skill. It is a plaster bust of Voltaire, copied from a large Parisian bronze, esteemed as the best representation of the celebrated philosopher. The copy by Dallin is said to be a faithful representation, on a small scale.

Wants to Come to Utah.—A young man named Albert Newberry, whose address is 1755 Juniper Street, (Nictown, Philadelphia, Pa.), writes and states that he can turn his hand to any kind of ordinary work. He offers his services to anybody who will pay him passage to Utah, and will bind himself to labor with such party until he is reimbursed. Brother Newberry's letter is countersigned by Joseph B. Miller, missionary from this city, and Samuel Harrison, President of the Philadelphia branch of the Church.

Invention by Wm. J. Silver.—We are pleased to be able to state that Brother Wm. J. Silver, of this city, one of the most competent engineers in the West, has just obtained a United States Patent for an improvement in hydraulic motors. It principally consists in relieving the outside portions of the motor from pressure and throwing it upon the joints of smaller diameter. This is a great advantage and admits of remarkable facility in cleaning or repairing. The invention is applicable in ordinary city motors or those used for any kind of mill purposes. The inventor has just received an order for one to be placed in Armstrong's grist mill at the mouth of City Creek.

"Stop That Man."—"Stop that man—stop him," shouted one of the gentlemen clerks of Z. C. M. & Co. who pursued a person who was flying before him in the direction of this office, this afternoon. Several persons joined in the chase, among whom was brother Robert Patrick, who gained upon the fugitive and finally caught him in the Tithing Office yard. His name is Harvey Green, of Sessions, an old offender. He had been caught in the act of stealing table-cloths in Z. C. M. & Co. the value of \$5. He was taken by the Tithing men and placed in jail to await his trial before Justice Pyper.

THE PIONEER FOLDING BED-STEAD.

JOHN SUNBECK, OF THIS CITY, MAKES HIS DEBUT AS AN INVENTOR.

John Sunbeck, of the 18th Ward of this city, has invented a folding bedstead that we feel confident will create a complete revolution in that branch of furniture. It is, so far as we know, entirely novel, and we see no reason why its adoption should not become universal, it is so far ahead of anything of the kind to use in any part of the world at the present time. It is not only a marvel of ingenuity, but remarkable, on account of its simple and peculiar construction, for its strength. The inventor tested its power in this particular by getting five men of ordinary weight, at one time, to crowd upon it.

The body of the bedstead will be of some strong fabric, which is set into the sides without the aid of nails. There is also a head-piece which is so constructed as to be placed at any desired angle by a mere touch of the hand. The legs, frame and head-piece all fold up snugly between the sides. When the whole thing is shut up, it only measures four inches in width, five inches in height and five feet in length, so that anybody possessing one of these ingenious pieces of mechanical construction, can, without difficulty, take up his bed, put it under his arm and walk.

Mr. Sunbeck has already secured the United States patent for his invention, which cost him five years of hard study to bring it to the desired point of perfection. But his time has been profitably spent, as we believe it eclipses every other invention of the kind. The patent covers every point he claimed, including the method of fastening the cloth into the sides, the hinges, hooks, springs, braces, etc. He is likely soon also to have a patent from Canada, and also from Great Britain.

The purposes for which the "Pioneer Folding Bedstead" is specially adapted are the army, all kinds of camping out, hotels, hospitals and sick-rooms generally, all places where space is at a premium, and is just the thing for summer use in this country, where people prefer to sleep in the open air.

Mr. Sunbeck has already been offered \$5,000 for the exclusive right to manufacture in one of the States, and a royalty of 50 cents on each bedstead made. He has not yet accepted the offer. He is about to begin the manufacture of the article in this city, on premises which he has engaged on Commercial Street, for the purpose. For some time, however, he will be exclusively engaged in filling orders already received, which are quite numerous. The model, which we have person, ally examined, has been shown to some of the leading physicians in this city, who state that it has never been equalled for sick-room purposes. An excellent feature connected with the invention is the cheapness of the article, which can be made, including walnut woodwork, excepting the sides, which will be of softer and lighter wood, for five dollars.

In this instance, the old adage that "necessity is the mother of invention" has been verified. About five years ago Mr. Sunbeck was crowded for room in his house, and he sought his first idea from that circumstance regarding the "economizing of space in the matter of bedsteads." He kept plodding at it from that time until he developed this important invention.

NEATS FOOT OIL.

SUMMERHAYS AND PARKER SUCCESSFULLY CONDUCTING ITS MANUFACTURE.

A home industry of considerable importance is being developed in this city by Summerhays & Parker, the former of whom was the initiator of the enterprise. We refer to the manufacture of pure neats foot oil. Being exercised over the fact of so much material going to waste that might be put to good purpose, these gentlemen began experimenting last spring. At first they used boilers, and were discouraged by the attempt being a financial failure, as the product was insufficient to meet the expenses incurred. Nothing daunted, however, they had a couple of large vats constructed at their factory in the 19th Ward pasture, one with a capacity of 1,000 gals. and the other 800 gals. Steam worms were introduced, and the difficulty was dispelled, as the enterprise has been conducted ever since, on a safe basis, giving a moderate profit to the manufacturers.

It is here in order to name the fact that when Messrs. Summerhays and Parker were in a street place Mr. David James and the firm of Latimer, Taylor & Co. stepped forward, generously and rendered substantial aid in the fitting up of the work.

The oil is of excellent quality, and is noticeably more reliable than the imported. As a general rule, the position of the man in regard to sausage, "we know what it's made of," applies to home manufacturers, while eastern productions are necessarily more or less mysterious. Another advantage of this oil over the eastern stuff is that the latter is put up only in one gallon and five gallon cans, while the Parker & Summerhays' product is neatly put up in pints, quarts, half gallons, gallons and five gallons. It is sold at the same price as the imported oil.

The manufacturers of the home product do not sell at retail, but deal directly with the country stores, and have about as many orders as they can conveniently fill.

The oil is excellent for use in tanneries. One institution of that kind in the south has entirely abolished the use of eastern oil and adopted it exclusively. It is unequalled for oiling harness, boots and shoes, as well as leather of almost every kind and is good for lubricating machinery. The makers got a bronze medal for their neat's foot oil at the late fair.

The industry has had a humble beginning, but will yet grow into very extensive proportions. Other products are being developed in connection with it, and will, before long, be placed on the market. The manufacturers purchase it from the butchers' materials that were formerly thrown away, and an article is produced that keeps money at home and contributes its quota of labor.

CITY COUNCIL.

Proceedings at the City Council Tuesday evening, December 27th, 1881, Mayor Little, presiding:

The committee on claims, to whom was referred the quarterly report of the supervisor of streets, reported that they found the same correct and the expenditures properly made. They therefore returned the report for approval, and recommended that the sum of \$2,884.96 be appropriated to cancel the expenditure to November 30th, 1881. Adopted.

The committee on irrigation, to whom was referred the quarterly report of the watermaster, submitted the report, stating that they had examined the accounts and found them correct, and recommended that \$206.80 be appropriated to balance the watermaster's account. Adopted.

The committee on public grounds, to whom was referred the petition of Andrew T. Case, asking a lease of the Tenth Ward Square, for the ensuing year, reported, recommending that the petition be given a lease on the same terms as formerly, and with the proviso that the lessee keep the fence in repair and fertilize the land as much as possible. Adopted.

The bill for an ordinance prohibiting the use of motors in connection with the water works, came up as unfinished business and was laid over for two weeks.

In view of the great amount of drunkenness among the youth of the city, on Monday last, the day generally observed as Christmas, caused by liquor saloons being allowed to keep open, on motion it was decided to be the sense of the Council that on Monday next, the day to be observed as New Year's, the Mayor of the City issue a proclamation in accordance with the law on the subject, requiring all liquor saloons to be closed the entire day.

On motion the city attorney was instructed to draft a bill for an ordinance licensing and regulating the playing of billiards, and report at the next sitting of the Council.

Adjourned for one week.

The Coming Attraction.—The production of "Sarotoga" on New Year's night, by the Home Dramatic Club, promises to be a notable event in theatricals. Mr. Alfred Lambourn is now finishing a new scene representing the Art Gallery in the Academy of Design, New York, which he has painted for this representation. The music of the evening also promises to be a specialty, as the Careless Orchestra will render several entirely new selections and a quartette will be introduced in the picnic scene in the third act. The ladies and gentlemen in the quartette are Miss Agnes Olsen, well known as the possessor of a rich soprano voice; Miss Richards, alto; Mr. Whitney, tenor; and Mr. Spencer, bass.

"Our Boarding House" will be given as a matinee on the same day.
