New York, Nov. 19 .- No more highly spiced French novels will get into this country if the second clerk in the Injuidation department of the custom house can prevent it. Hundreds of volumes will soon go up in smoke and fire. There is only one way in which a work which falls below the ethical standard of the Buddation de-partment can escape oblivion, and that is by being as old as it is bad. Works known as ancient and modern classics will not be held up. However, if one book which does not meet the approval of the consors is discovered in a package, all the others, no matter what their antecedents, will be destroyed. Among the consignment which came
