

ROOSEVELT REGRETS COCKRELL'S DEFEAT

ONE of the most notable victims of the Roosevelt landslide is Francis Marion Cockrell, senior United States senator from the state of Missouri, whose fifth consecutive term in the senate will expire on March 4, 1905. President Roosevelt expressed the general sentiment of Republicans and Democrats yesterday when he said:

"I am truly sorry that my good friend Senator Cockrell, retired from the United States senate as a result of the Republican victory in Missouri."

Senator Cockrell has long been a conspicuous figure on the Democratic side of the chamber. While the Democrats held brief control of the senate during

"I regard the retirement of Senator Cockrell as a loss to the entire country. No man in the senate has exerted himself so conscientiously and persistently to save the people's money as he. By his close inspection of appropriation bills and other measures to take money from the treasury, he has saved the government millions of dollars. Cockrell stands for the strictest economy, and his patriotic enough not to stand in the way of an appropriation which has for its purpose the nation's welfare. His honesty, integrity and patriotic motives stamp him as one of the noblest figures in the senate, and his absence from that body will be seriously felt."

THIRTY YEARS A SENATOR.

the Cleveland administration he was chairman of the committee on appropriations, and as such was playfully spoken of as "watchdog of the treasury," because of his well known views regarding an economical expenditure of the public money. When the Republicans regained control of the senate, Mr. Cockrell became the ranking member of the minority on the same committee, but continued as the special senatorial guardian of Uncle Sam's strong box.

WATCHING EVERY MEASURE.

Visitors entering the gallery while the senate was in session had pointed out to them an old man, closely resembling some of the caricatures of Uncle Sam, sitting in the front row of seats on the Democratic side of the chamber, following attentively the ordinary routine proceedings with the strictest attention. Spread out upon his desk was a complete file of every bill introduced in and report made to the senate. While other senators were otherwise engaged it seemed to be Senator Cockrell's mission to scrutinize every legislative proposition involving the expenditure of government funds.

A Republican senator, commenting upon the expected retirement of Mr. Cockrell because of the changed political complexion of the Missouri legislature, paid this tribute to him:

FRENCH NOVELS.

No More Naughty Ones Are to be Allowed to Come in.

New York, Nov. 19.—No more highly spiced French novels will get into this country if the senate clerk in the liquidation department of the custom house can prevent it. The official named is busily engaged in going over all sorts of contributions from French writers and his office is rapidly taking on the appearance of a book store. Hundreds of volumes will soon go up in smoke and fire. There is only one way in which a work which falls below the ethical standard of the liquidation department can escape oblivion, and that is by being as old as it is bad. Works known as ancient and modern classics will not be held up. However, if one book which does not meet the approval of the censors is discovered in a package, all the others, no matter what their antecedents, will be destroyed. Among the contributors which came over on the last French steamer were works which were declared to be so far beyond the pale that the censor was disposed to condemn them without the preliminaries of a trial. They dealt with the seamy side of life in Paris, with the mysticism of the east, and taken all in all the critics were distressed by them. It has been found that the number of French books coming under the disapproval of the treasury department has greatly increased since last May. Most of this class of literature was consigned to small dealers in the French quarter.

N. Y. Pneumonia Commission.

New York, Nov. 19.—The civil service commission of Greater New York has ruled that the commission of medical experts appointed last year by the city authorities to investigate pneumonia and its causes cannot employ assistants in other cities unless the physicians and employed first come to New York and undergo a municipal civil service examination.

FOOTBALL PLAYERS.

Subject to an Ailment Like Softening of the Brain.

Chicago, Nov. 19.—Football players, according to Jere Delaney, trainer of Northwestern university, eleven, are subject to an ailment similar to softening of the brain, which leads not only to the making of peculiar statements but causes strange actions, which sometimes are amusing.

The exact cause of the trouble, Trainee Delaney said, he is unable to fathom. He declared, however, that it results from the long continued physical and nervous strain to which the men are subjected during the three months of high training, which they are forced to undergo, than from the blows, kicks and bumps they receive on their skulls in the game.

It is known, said Delaney, "that every player of the game fights his game over and over again in his dreams, but only by the men who are least touch with the players is it recognized that they are given to peculiar, strange motions as if struggling with an imaginary opponent."

According to Delaney, the athletes are given to almost childish methods of play when at rest. An instance related by the trainer was of a man who during more than an hour pored over a map of the United States, drawing lines with his index finger and imagining he was traveling over the country which his finger crossed.

A REMARKABLE STORY.

All About a Torpedoboot Destroyer of Great Speed.

New York, Nov. 19.—A remarkable story comes from the Glasgow correspondent of the American to the effect that a torpedoboot destroyer of great speed, built in an English shipyard, has been delivered to the Russian government, and that Boris Roche, ex-member of parliament from Ireland and a few years ago well known in society and club life in New York, had command of the boat during its voyage through the Kiel ship canal to Libau, on the Baltic.

According to the correspondent details of the matter were brought to Glasgow by members of the boat's crew who have returned from Russia aboard a merchant vessel. The dispatch asserts that the builders of the craft were led to believe that certain persons in New York desired to purchase it for the purpose of racing against a steam yacht owned by a millionaire sportsman. They built a temporary dock house, concealing the lines of the war vessel; the torpedo tubes were sheathed over with canvas, and the boat was completely in an American port. By this method, it is alleged, the builders supposed they were merely aiding in establishing a great record for their creation, but, according to the story now told, the little war vessel took an entirely different course, and, manned by a picked crew made a quick run to Libau.

There is no official confirmation of the story.

SOCIAL DEMOCRATS.

In Four Years Their Vote Has Grown to Half a Million.

New York, Nov. 19.—A statement issued by officials of the Social Democratic party announces that the party's followers have grown from 57,739, as shown by the ballot of 1900, to 500,000 in 1904.

"Every state, with the exception of Massachusetts and possibly Colorado," says the statement, "reports an increase, Illinois leading with a vote which will be nearer to 100,000 than to the 75,000 reported last week."

"The middle west—Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska—is the field in which this year the Socialistic vote is most marked."

A feature of the election was the almost complete extinction of the Socialist Labor party, especially in New York, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Illinois, where its adherents were formerly active."

ADOLPH WEBER HELD FOR MURDER

Coroner's Jury Charges Him With Killing Father, Mother, Sister and Brother.

MORE COMPLICATIONS ARISE.

Accused Man's Demander Unchanged—Attorneys for Prosecution and Defense Come to Blows.

Auburn, Cal., Nov. 18.—Adolph Weber received the news of the coroner's jury verdict charging him with the murder of his father, mother, sister and brother with a look of calmation, and said nothing as to his opinion concerning it. His demeanor in court this morning was unchanged.

R. J. Hancock gave some important testimony, which still further complicated the mystery, as Mr. Weber's body was found in the bathroom. He testified that he was one of the first persons there and saw Mrs. Snowden, who was screaming, and Mr. McKinstry. He broke the lower pane of the front window of the front room, from which the bodies were taken out, and tried to pull the piano toward him, but the smoke drove him out. As he came down the steps of the porch he thought Adolph Weber came up. He says the child was carried out by a tall man. The back window of the dining room was broken and there was no fire in that room. The whole hall was on fire and no one could have passed through it. The bathroom was all dark when the house was pretty well burned down. He broke the window and looked in, but could see nothing, and there was no fire in the room. When he tried to get into the front room it was so full of smoke that he could not see the floor. He could not tell how Adolph was dressed when he met him. The window of the dining room was broken and the curtains gone.

John Davis, who built the Weber house, said that the front room, where the bodies were found, was about thirteen feet square. J. K. Curry went when the fire bell rang and saw Mrs. Snowden and Chris Henry. There was no light shining through the front door. No one broke the front window until George Ruth and Guy Lukens did so. Mrs. Weber was brought out first. He recognized her face. One of her legs was half burned off. He might have been mistaken as to it being Mrs. Weber. They bent out the fire in her clothes with their hats. This was also done to Bertha Weber's body. He afterward heard that Adolph was near the house, not on her porch.

D. W. Lubeck, vice president of the Placer county bank, denied on the stand the rumor that Julius Weber repaid the money stolen from that institution, or offered to repay it.

The strained relations between District Attorney Robinson and Atty. Tabor came to a climax today. Blows were exchanged and a lively fight was in progress when Under Sheriff May interfered and stopped it.

Russia Buys Ships.

New York, Nov. 19.—Another report is current, says a Herald dispatch from St. Petersburg, that four Argentine warships have been bought through a French agent and will join Vice Admiral Rojestvensky's fleet, thus giving him a strong preponderance over the Japanese fleet.
