BLUE OUTLOOK FOR COAL.

Householders Placing Storage Orders Find There is None to be Had.

Local coal dealers say that numerous householders are ordering quantities of coal for July and August delivery to hold in storage against the demands for the coming winter. But the demands are at this date more than the supply, so dealers say, and the Union Pacific road has been shipping into Cheyenne coal from western Virginia. It is said that the Harriman lines are 50,000 tons behind in the storage of coal, and have actually none now in stock. In view of the steadily increasing demand from the smelters, the manufacturing industries, and the increasing number of houses and buildings generally, the outlook for the coming cold season is not en-couraging. coal for July and August delivery to ouraging.

In the original complaint Mrs. George did not ask for attorney's fees or alimony, but it was amended by Mr. Thomas to pro-vide for \$100 attorney's fees and \$40 per month alimony.
