REMAINS OF ELEPHANTS AND MAS-TODONS FOUNDIN ALASKA ... A few days since we published a letter from Mr. Doll, who is pursuing scientific researches in Alaska, in which he stated that fessil remains of the elephant and musk ox were frequent in a region extending 1,300 miles from the coast, along the river Youkon to Fort Youkon, in the interior. We now learn from a morning contemporary that remains of the mastodon have also been found in Alaska, and that a portion of a well preserved tusk belonging to that extinct monster has been brought to this city by the officers of the Western Union Telegraph Expedition, while another specimen has been sent to the Smithsonian Institute at Washington. Fossil ivory is found in several portions of the Arctic regions in quantities sufficient to make it of commercial importance, and may yet be discovered in such quantities in Alaska. Entire remains of the elephant and mastodon have also been found well preserved in ice. European accounts describe a complete carcass, daltr with the flesh and hair in a good state of preservation, of an elephant which was found melting out of the ice in the North Sea some years ago, having come down from early geologic ages. The mastedon tusk mentioned by the Alta was found near Behring's Straits; it was about 12 feet in length and 17 inches in circumference, and some pertion of the ivory is well enough preserved to be useful. Col. Bulkley says the bones and portions of the hair and skin of an entire animal of this species were found a few years since, imbedded in the ice, near East Cape, on the Siberian side of Behring Straits, and are now deposited in the royal Museum at St. Petersburg. -San Fran. Bul.
