DISASTROUS FLOODS Play Havoc with Roads and Ditches

and do Much Damage.

Special Correspondence,

Fairview, Sanpete Co., Aug. 7 .--- Yesterday afternoon about 1 o'clock a dun rumbling noise was heard, which continued for one hour, resembling distant thunder, Later on it was ascertained that two floods had occurred north of town, one at Oak Creek and another at Milburn, which had done considerably damage, both to dwellings, farms and land. It has been rumored here that in at least one house the water poured right in through the windows and filled cellars so the people had to flee for safer quarters. Last night about 10 o'clock a flood

was heard coming down the Cotton-wood canyon, and before many minutes a tremendous body of water was at the edge of town carrying everything be fore it, and at that time it was dark as pitch, only a few lanterns could be seen moving around and men found them moving around and men found them selves unable to do much toward guid-ing the wild waters in their course; so this morning your correspondent waded around through the mud to ascertain the extent of the damage, and found that the railroad track east of town had been of great benefit as the grade in the place where the water was comhad been of great benefit as the grade in the place where the water was com-ing was naturally pretty high and di-vided the force of the stream so that the water found its way into many of the irrigating ditches and carried in over a bigger scope of country and thereby weakened its force. Still, it was a sorrowful sight to see bridgee and a sorrowful sight to see bridges and culverts torn up and removed and their places filled up with boulders, logs, roots and rubbish, fences, lumber, wagons, harrows, hay rakes, and other farming implements arrived action farming implements carried away, or buried in the mud; hay stacks, pigs and chickens were carried away, and many cellars were filled with water, creating great losses to the owners. This is the canyon where all the coal haulers trav-el with their loads from the mines east of here, and the road is, of course. here, and the road is, of course, destroyed.

IDAHO.

Weekly Crop and Weather Bulletin.

United States department of agriculture, Idaho section, climate and crop bulletin of the weather bureau: Boise, Idaho, Aug. 6, 1901 .- During the past week there was practically no abatement of the warm weather that has been nearly continuous for 30 days. The mean temperature for the state averaged 6 degrees above the normal

daily, and the maximum reached 115 degrees. On the night of the 1st and morning of the 2nd showers occurred in many sections, but they were too light to be of benefit, except in the extreme southeastern counties. The winds were light and variable. The atmosphere about Camas Prairie is laden with smoke as the result of fires in the sighboring mountains.

CROPS

Fruit: In properly irrigated orchards the fruit is making good growth and in orchards carefully cultivated and wa-tered the growth of the tree is marked. Mr. C. B. Simpson, special entomolo-gist of the agricultural department, who is making a study of the codling moth in Idaho, states as follows con-cerning the condition of the fruit: "In neglected orchards with a fairly good crop the amount of wormy fruit is about the same as last year. In same distance from the valley settlements we are keeping in touch with affairs in the larger cities below. the water was abundant the second cutting of lucern far surpassed the first crop as to yield and was secure in excellent condition. The timothy, red clover and wild hay crops were especi-

ally heavy in the northern counties. Vegetables and Melons: All markets are abundantly supplied with vegetables and the potato crop promises fair results, except in the extreme south-eastern countles. Corn is growing rapidly and nutmeg cantaloupes, having ripened rapidly, are being shipped in good season.

Stock: Stock is reported in good condition as a rule, although there is much suffering owing to scarcity of water in the lateral mountain ranges of the southeastern counties. The Snake river is reported unusually low.
