PROPERTY LOOKS LIKE A BONANZA.

Manager Burnham Confident He Has One in the Southern Pacific Near Ogden.

SHOWS A FINE GRADE OF COPPER

Management Pushing Work in Different Directions to Tap the Main Ore Body.

Before leaving for the Southern Pacific mine, near Ogden, Manager Burnham said that he was more confident than ever that he has the making of a bonanza in that property. During the past two months the company has expended in the neighborhood of \$5,000 in developing the ore bodies. A main tunnel is now being run to tap the ledge several hundred feet below the surface. Work is likewise being pushed in the shaft. The ore in the mine proves to be a fine grade of copper. Assays from samples recently brought in showed values as high as 23.5 per cent copper. It is the intention of the company to push development during the winter and to that end the force at the mine has been increased, and will be further augmented as men can be put on to advantage.

ON THE EXCHANGE.

Business Brisker but Still Far Below Its Nominal Value.

The movement of stocks on the mining exchange this morning was somewhat brisker than during the past few days. While this is the fact it is far below the normal volume of business. Consolidated Mercantile was pounded down from yesterday's quotations and sold on the open board at 90 cents flat. New York entered the list and sold briskly at figures around 16 1/2 cents per share. Daily-Judge was sold at \$10.50 and \$10.50 per share in small lots. Tetra, Martha Washington, Ajax and La Reine also were among the sellers. Among the non-sellers 24 1/2 cents was offered without bringing out a share. South Swansea was offered at 12 cents, while \$17.00 was offered for United States Mining. STRIKE IN THE UTAH.

A Pipe of Good Shipping Ore Opened on the Seventh Level.

Advices from Fish Springs, which were received this morning at the local office of the Utah Mining company, state that a strike has been made in the seventh level of the mine Wednesday. When the letter was sent the body had not been explored to any depth, so that its size could not be determined. Assays from the strike show that it is shipping ore of a like quality with that heretofore encountered in the mine. Everything is moving smoothly at the property and the regular shipments will be kept up.

DREDGING THE COLORADO.

A New Company to Rob the River of Its Auriferous Gravel.

Early in the year a company was organized under the title of the New York & Good Hope Placer Mining company to dredge for gold on the Colorado river. That corporation, whose name will now appear, has completed its arrangements and that dredging will begin at once on the auriferous bars of the river. The dredging will be prosecuted between Dandy crossing and Good Hope, a distance of 18 miles, and it is understood that there are 400,000,000 yards of gravel to be washed. The company has secured coal measures in the Henry mountains and will do the dredging by means of electric power.

CENTURY DIRECTORS.

Contemplate Visiting Well Known Park Valley Mine Soon.

The directors of the Century Gold Mining company contemplate making a trip to that Park Valley mine in the near future for the purpose of making a thorough inspection of the properties of that corporation. Those who will comprise the party are P. W. Madsen, Thomas R. Cutler, Elias A. Smith, E. T. Studness, Prof. J. B. Toronto, and R. W. Madsen. Attorney E. B. Orin also will make the trip with the officials.

Manager P. W. Madsen has things in good shape for the winter's campaign at the mine. A supply of coal sufficient to last several months has been taken in and the new water pipe line, 1,000 feet in length, has been completed. The pipe laid is 3 inches in diameter and provides the company with water for the mill and for all other purposes.

TRAPPER'S PRIDE STRIKE.

A New Body of Ore Encountered in Trapper's Tunnel.

Supt. McLain, who is in charge of the Trapper's Pride mine, near Marysville, has advised Manager P. W. Madsen that he has encountered a new body of ore in the Trapper's tunnel. Several stockholders in the mine, residing at Steelhead, visited the property a few days ago and have expressed themselves as being highly pleased with conditions. Manager Madsen says the mine will surely be provided with milling facilities early next spring.

UNCLE SAM SLOW.

Bingham Mining Men Impatiently Awaiting Government Report.

There is considerable inquiry among mining men interested in Bingham concerning the government report of the geological survey of the district. It is now a number of months since the survey was completed, and it has been promised for some time, but is now forthcoming. The last date set for its appearance was Oct. 15. A prominent mining man in speaking of the matter, said this morning that it generally is the case that the miners have abandoned a camp before the publication of the government survey. This may be stretching the matter, yet it does seem that a little more haste might be used by Uncle Sam in getting out this class of reports.

Minola Looking Well.

Manager Maynes of the Minola mine at Park City has returned from a visit to the property. He reports everything at the mine looking as usual. Drifting is under way along the ledge and the outlook is encouraging.

GREAT RICHES OF THE COLUMBUS.

Ore is Increasing in Value as the Development Work in the Mine Increases.

LAST SHIPMENT A HUMMER.

The Management is Preparing to Place the Property Among the First Rate Producers.

The ore bins at the Columbus mine at Alta are filling up at a rapid rate. While it is thought there will be no difficulty in shipping ore during the winter, still there is a lull in shipments at the present time, owing to it being a middle season between wheeling and sleighing.

As development goes on the value of ores are increasing from this mine. Two car loads of ore which were sampled yesterday gave the remarkable returns of 200 ounces in silver and 30 per cent lead, being nearly double the amount of that of previous shipments. Only development work is going on at the mine, and all the ore taken out is the product of blocking out the bodies. Still last month the six car loads brought to the market netted the company \$11,905.69, and with the increased values now coming out this amount will be very much augmented during November.

Work in the new mill will be pushed the coming spring, and the management thinks that during the coming year the mine will give the big producers of the state a tight run to maintain their position in the lead.

ARE NEARING THE VEIN.

Mountain Lake People Will Tap Ledge Within the Next Few Feet.

From samples of rock received by Senator Rawlins from the Mountain Lake mine at Alta yesterday, it is clearly demonstrated that the deep tunnel now being run at the mine will tap the vein within the next few feet. This ledge is being driven to catch the tunnel on the southwestern portion of the property, and the continuation of the ore bodies. The ledge is the same one which has been developed in the old workings of the mine to the northeast of the present workings. If the vein shows up equally strong at this end of the mine, the senator's crowd will have a bonanza of no mean dimensions.

No ore will be shipped from the mine during the winter as the winter's campaign is snapped out to continue development work along present lines and reserve ore shipments until next spring. The usual force of men is at work at the mine.

THE FIRST CHECK.

Majestic Company Deposits Proceeds of First Carload of Matte.

The first check for the output of the Majestic was deposited in the bank yesterday. It was this big of paper that the management and stockholders have been awaiting anxiously for many months. The check was for \$2,500, and represents the selling price of the first carload of matte shipped from the smelter. The second carload is at the Taylor & Brunton sampler and will be marketed within the next few hours. Everything is reported to be working smoothly at the smelter, and matte shipments will in all probability be regular from now on.

Pushing the Wabash.

Col. Treweek writes from New York to the effect that he is succeeding admirably in his mission east. He says that he will in all probability be through so as to reach Utah the latter part of the present month. Work has been going smoothly at the Wabash for the past few days. The shaft is now down 775 feet, so that 174 feet has been accomplished since sinking was resumed.

Judge Sommer's New Project.

Judge Morris Sommer is working up a new mining proposition near Marysville. The property lies adjoining the Trapper's Pride and is considered to be one of the salt edged groups in that well known district.

Ore and Bullion.

The ore and bullion receipts as reported by McCormick & Co. yesterday amounted in the whole to \$61,800. Of this amount \$33,600 was for ores, leaving \$28,200 for base bullion.

New Ogden Company.

The Barker Mining company, of Ogden, filed a copy of its articles of incorporation in the secretary of state's office today. Its capital stock is \$30,000, divided into shares of the par value of 10 cents each. J. N. Barker is president; H. E. Stiver, vice president; B. Torres, secretary and treasurer. The company owns the Ella, Snow Drop and Union lode claims located in Willard mining district, Boxelder county.

Ten carloads of Tintic ore and one carload of Nevada ore were reported at the Taylor and Brunton sampler yesterday.

The Taylor & Brunton sampler reported today one car of Deep Creek ore from Nevada, three from Tintic and one from Milford.

Manager Dorn of the Consolidated Mercantile returned last night from Mercur where he spent yesterday inspecting the mine and mill.

A big electrical locomotive has been ordered by the Boston Co. of Birmingham. The engine will be on the ground in a short time and will be used on the Copper Belt railroad as soon as completed.

The coroner's jury at Park City exonerated the Silver King consolidated management from all blame in the lamented accident which befell Edward Cutler at that mine recently.

G. W. Lamborne is back from a visit to the Daily-Judge at Park City. He says that the ore chutes at the mine are holding out finely. The ore bodies are broadening out and a bonanza seems to be assured.

Ore shipments are coming in regularly from the Continental mine at Alta. The management thinks that there will be no difficulty in keeping the road open this winter, as with all the snow of last winter teaming was kept up.

The new cage will be shortly installed at the Beaver Consolidated in Beaver county. Heretofore all the matter from the mine has been handled by the comparatively slow process of hoisting it in buckets. With the installation of machine drills the work of prospecting in the drift will be prosecuted a great deal easier as well as more swiftly.

Harvey J. Jones of the Liberal of Park City was up to the camp yesterday returning last evening. He reports that the storm was terrible at the Park as it was snowing and a blizzard blowing.

His reports that the mine is progressing finely. This tunnel which is run to cross-cut the formation with an objective point at a ledge which is still in the distance, is now in over 300 feet. A force of men is at work and will be continued during the winter.

LOCAL MARKETS.

Utah Apples Retailing at Twenty-Five Cents a Peck.

There are a number of changes in the local markets this week. There is a scarcity of salmon and halibut, and the price of the latter is made 15 cents straight. Scarcity in salmon used to be due to the exterminating system of the rivers, and the fishermen did not hesitate in taking the fish as they were ascending the rivers to spawn. But, it seems that the government has taken a hand in doing what inefficient state statutes could not accomplish, and the unscrupulous fishermen fear the government officers where they have no regard for state officials. So the pound system of fishing is no more. Eggs still continue high, and pork here will remain firm, if not higher, and Utah apples are retailing at four bits per peck.

PENNSYLVANIA FORCED DOWN.

Continuation of Enormous Sales Causes it to Make a New Low Record.

AFFILIATED STOCKS WEAK.

Unexplained Liquidation Made an Impression on the Entire Market.

New York, Nov. 12.—A continuation of the recent enormous sales of Pennsylvania forced it to 11 1/2, a new low level for the movement. Affiliated stocks weakened in sympathy and the general market felt the impression produced by the unexplained liquidation. Determined support of Pennsylvania at about 112 caused a better tone. Sugar rose an extreme 2 1/2 and Pacific Mail 1 1/2.

Bonds at noon were steady.

A brief selling movement in United States Steel preferred cancelled its previous gain, but the market otherwise was not affected. Pennsylvania broke through 112 and declined to 111 1/2, notwithstanding good support and the market gave way in sympathy. Sugar reacted a point and Atchison lost a point.
