SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL.

Proposition Before Solons to Construct Sewers in Southwestern Portion of City.

AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY.

Suit Against A. O. U. W.—More Stein Complications—Vandals Take Advantage of Halloween's Eve.

At the city council meeting last night a resolution was introduced providing that the city engineer make estimate of the cost of constructing a sewer in the southwestern portion of the city, and report back to the city council. The resolution was passed.

The council also allowed a large number of estimates made by the city engineer for paving, curbing and gutting and sewer construction done by J. J. Moran, J. P. O'Neill and L. C. Brown. The total of the estimates amounted to \$23,000.

Recommendation of the committee in claims, the demand of Mrs. Agnes Rivers and of Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Jones for \$100 each as damages because of alleged injuries received on Washington avenue by reason of obstructions, were not allowed. Another claim for \$100 damages was presented by Olive R. Jones, and this was referred to the committee on claims. The recommendations of Chief G. C. Graves of the fire department for a number of repairs and improvements at the fire station were approved and ordered made.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

At yesterday's session of the board of county commissioners a communication was received from Frank A. Farrington of West Weber and Mrs. Margaret Walker of Huntsville. Each claimed damages on account of injuries to their legs and clothing due to bad bridges. The claims are to be investigated.

The county board will meet again on Friday evening to complete the appointment of election judges. There are many vacancies and the board yesterday found that it had no lists of eligible names from which to make appointments. The board will fill all vacancies at Friday's meeting.

SUIT AGAINST A. O. U. W.

A suit has been filed by Mrs. William Stager against the A. O. U. W. grand lodge for the collection of \$2,000 insurance on a beneficiary certificate issued to her husband by Fidelity lodge No. 3 of this city. The question raised by the action and on which the lodge refused to pay the amount, is whether Mr. Stager's connection with the liquor business was such as to bar him from collecting on the certificate. INCIDENT STRIKE

IN WOOLEN MILLS.

Causes Little Flurry Among Weavers.

SESSION OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

Railroad Wants Pedlers Excluded from Depot Grounds—Weddings—Joseph Walton's Golden Wedding.

Special Correspondence.

Provo, Utah Co., Nov. 1.—At the meeting of the city council held last evening the board of health recommended that the Teulirde Power company be permitted to maintain the cesspool constructed near the mouth of Provo canyon by lowering it below the bottom of the river bed, and cementing it all the way above the river bed. This proposition had been made by the Power company. Report adopted.

A petition from C. E. Loose et al, asking for the creation of sewer district and a petition from property owners on Third West street asking for a reconsideration of the action creating sewer district No. 4 extension were both referred to the committee on sewer.

F. Fouts, agent of the R. G. W. Railway company, petitioned for an amendment to the city ordinance on peddling so that peddlers may be prohibited from entering upon the depot grounds, was referred to the committee on judiciary. The petition states that the amendment desired was for the protection of children who were now in the habit of peddling fruit around the depot.

The San Pedro, Los Angeles and Salt Lake Railroad company presented a communication asking for further extension of the track between the trunk of Academy avenue and Sixth South street. The communication stated that the reason for asking the extension was that the matter of building a union depot was now being considered by the San Pedro, Los Angeles and Salt Lake Railway company and the Rio Grande Western Railway company, and that in case the companies decided to build the improvement in the way of planning would not be needed. The request was denied.

The committee on sewer recommended that the east drain sewer be extended 200 feet. Report adopted.

WOOLEN MILLS "STRIKE."

A misunderstanding of some rules and scale of wages, which Manager Bassett of the Provo Woolen Mills company caused to be posted in the weave room, caused the weavers, when they arrived yesterday morning, to refrain from proceeding with their work till Manager Bassett arrived. The scale of wages is the same as has been in vogue for some time, but the card gave notice of fines which would be imposed for imperfect work, and this was what caused the delay. The card also stated that the fines have also been in effect, theoretically, for a long time, but have not been strictly enforced. Recently several pieces of goods have been returned from customers on account of defects and it was considered necessary to enforce the fines and the cards were posted in order to give the operators fair warning.

After a talk with the manager, a committee from the weavers was appointed and the committee, Manager Bassett and Mr. Dunham, superintendent of the weave department, had a conference, which ended in a satisfactory understanding of conditions, and work was resumed. It is claimed by the management, and figures to prove the claim was submitted to the committee. Bassett said the Provo Woolen Mills pay a higher scale of wages for weaving than any mill in the United States, and it is also claimed that the Provo factory is the only factory in the country that pays a bonus for superior work.


