LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**Excursion.**—Eight cars with a caboose, all loaded up with happy excursionists, left the depot, this morning, for Ogden and Lake Side. The weather to-day is as propitious for the party as could be desired.

**Driving off Stock.**—The following telegram was received per Deseret Telegraph line, just before going to press: MANTI, July 15, 2:30 p.m. The Indians are now driving off stock from the range here.

**Elder W. C. Staines.**—By letter from Brother Staines, written at New York, dated the 7th inst., we learn that the steamship *Manhattan* would leave Liverpool, for New York, with a company of Saints, on Tuesday, July 13th. Brother Staines states that the rate of passage for emigrants over the Union Pacific line will not be near so low as he anticipated it would be, and, consequently, thinks that the emigration will be considerably smaller than it would have been at cheaper rates.

**St. George.**—"J" writes from St. George, Washington county, on the 5th instant a capital letter, containing account of the Anniversary of Independence and other matters there. We should be glad to print this communication in full, but as it only came to hand this morning it is rather too late to do so. The celebration of the 4th was a big affair, and was as joyous and festive as it could well be, consisting of the exercises and pleasures usual on that occasion among the people of Utah, nothing occurring to mar the general joy but a heavy rain towards the close of the proceedings.

The following paragraphs from "J's" letter may be of interest: "To-day the harvest of small grain (which is nearly completed) goes on, and the husbandman, ever alive to business, is bringing in the great oads of yellow sheaves as usual.

The crop of small grain is excellent and large, and nearly all safely gathered. The prospect for corn, cotton, and sorghum only moderate. We have a patch of Japan rice that looks splendid.

The grass crop promises unusually fine and large.

Apple crop, not large but good, and peaches will ripen large and of excellent flavor, but of quantity less than usual.

We have one large, luscious, rosy and temptingly ripe before us as we write. Apples and early apples, gone, bybrid cherries large, full, and ripening; shall have ripe grapes for the 24th.

No grasshoppers have put in appearance here yet. Bees are doing remarkably well, and generally, we may be considered in a state of domestic tranquility and prosperity, which with a general state of health is a good "State" to live in."

**Rhubarb.**—An exchange says, "As soon as rhubarb is out of season, the soil between the plant should be hoed to break the crust of the surface and kill weeds, a mulch or top dressing of rich manure should be applied, and the plants be allowed to throw out leaves and recuperate for the ensuing season. The late crop of leaves should not be gathered. They should be allowed to remain until withered by frost, and then to lie over the roots all winter to protect them from alternate freezing and thawing. Plants treated in this way will be strong and vigorous ones next year."

**Military.**—A part of companies I. and K., of the 13th U. S. Infantry, accompanied by a brass band, passed through the city to-day on their way to Camp Douglas, where they will be stationed. They are just in from Montana.

**SERIOUS CHARGES AGAINST A FEDERAL OFFICIAL.**—The people of Wyoming are tired of the present U. S. Marshal of that Territory, a Mr. Church Howe. The Wyoming Tribune of a late date, as a reason for his removal, charges him with employing his law partner to act for the defense in cases wherein the United States was plaintiff, and in cases where he himself arrested the defendants in the name of the United States. He has arrested parties whom he afterwards offered to clear for a certain sum of money. He has released, temporarily, individuals against whom crimes had been proved, and who were on their way to prison, in order to use them for his personal aggrandizement. All this and more Howe is charged with, and the Tribune says that proofs by affidavits are now on file at Washington. It very properly concludes by saying that the further continuance in office of this man Howe is a disgrace to the administration and to the Territory, and a libel upon the cause of good government.

The people of this Territory have been now had cause to complain of Federal officials, and have been accused of disloyalty for so doing. Wonder if the people of Wyoming will have a similar experience?

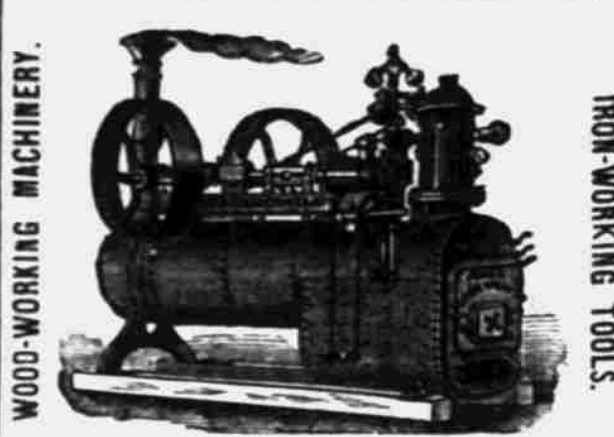
