One sort of lace trimming is not enough nowadays; there must be two, or even three varieties on the lingerie frock, or a combination of lace and swiss embroidery may be used. This very simple little dress of white batiste and lace insertion is made very striking and individual by the inserted motifs of Italian ladder work, which give an old-fashioned yet smart look to the dress. In setting such motifs into sheer material the lace should be stitched by machine over the batiste and thinner lace. The material under the motif should then be cut away to within a quarter inch of the stitching, and this narrow edge should be turned back and run by hand with very small stitches and fine cotton.

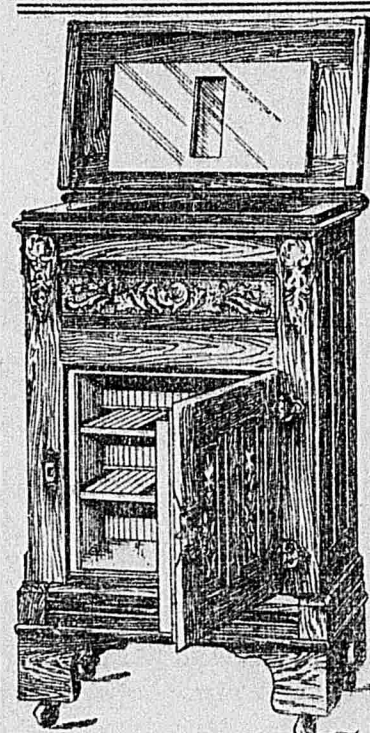
