Members receive four per ent jon their deposits, in addition to which the bank borrows from large capitalists at two or three per cent. These funds it loans to its members as eligible opportunities offer, in such a manner as to furnish them building funds for their homes and purchase money for their lots, to be repaid gradually out of their weekly earnings, with five per cent. interest.
