BEATRICES AND BENEDICTS.

An article in a Sydney paper discusses the relative proportions of men to women in the colonies of Oceania, It is true that the disparity of humbers is not so great now as it was, and the tendency is toward equalization. Yet ven in South Australia there are only 83 Beatrices for every 100 Benedicts, and this is the most blafily favored colony. In such colonies as Western Australia, "where the gold comes from," here are only about 59 spinsters for every 100 bachelors; in Queensland the percentage of unmarried temales to unmarried males is 65 and in New South Wales 78. New South Wales and Victoria can take the largest consignment of female emigrants, for the excess of unmarried men is 39,960 in the former alony and 78,668 in the latter. In Tasmania unly S.M. heroines are required. but New Zealand requires 43,557 for quality of the sexes.
