WOOD AND WILSON DISCHARGED. Asheville, N. C., July 22.—Federal Judge Pritchard today discharged Ticket Agents Wood and Wilson of the Southern railroad, on habeas cor-pus proceedings, and declared the pen-alty clause of the new rate bill uncon-stitutional. Wood and Wilson were recently sentenced to 20 days upon the chain gang for violation of the law. In his decision Judge Pritchard said the penalties inflicted by the statute would close the doors to a judicial hear-ing and would amount to \$2,500,000 a day if the penalty was enforced upon the sale of each ticket, which is eight times more than the amount involved in the original suit.
