FORTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.
SENATE.
WASHINGTON, 12.—Davis, of West
Virginia, presented the credentials
of Kennan, elected to succeed him as
Senator for West Virginia. Read
and filed.

Blair presented several petitions
of citizens of Virginia, North Carolina
and South Carolina for national
aid to common schools. The names
appended to these petitions, Blair
said, are mostly those of colored citizens
who are unable to read or
write, and as the press criticized
similar petitions heretofore presented
upon the ground that many were
written by one hand, he was immediately
induced by General Armstrong, of the
Hampton Institute, under whose
supervision the petitions were signed,
to state that all the signatures were
authentic.

Vest presented a memorial of the
most eminent citizens of St. Louis,
asking that Gen. Sherman when he
retires be placed on a retired list
with the rank of General.

Sawyer presented a petition of
citizens of Wisconsin for the passage
of the bill for the incorporation of the
National Trades Union, the tariff
bill was taken up and the Senate
went into executive session.

When the doors reopened, the
Senate resumed the consideration
of the tariff bill, the pending
question being on agreeing to the amendment
in relation to vinegar factories,
adopted on Saturday in the committee
of the whole. After a long debate
the amendment was rejected.

Miller, of New York, immediately
introduced as an amendment the
bill to repeal the act relating to vinegar
factories established and operated
prior to March 1st, 1872, which
was referred to the committee on
finance.

Other amendments made in committee
of the whole to the internal
revenue portion of the bill having
been considered, the Senate proceeded
to consider those made in committee
to the tariff sections.

The provision for levying duty on
goods composed of two or more materials
was amended so as to provide
that the duty shall be assessed at
the highest rates at which the component
materials are chargeable.

The amendment made in committee
of the whole fixing the duty on
sugar at 20 per cent. ad valorem,
was agreed to.

Sherman moved to insert: Iron in
pig, iron in kettles, spigot iron,
wrought or cast, scrap iron, or
tenths of one cent per pound, but nothing
shall be deemed scrap iron or scrap
steel except waste or refuse iron or
steel that has been in actual use
and changing the rate of duty from
three tenths of 1 cent per pound to
50 per cent; agreed to, yeas 28,
nays 24.

The amendment changing the
duty on iron from nine tenths of 1
cent per pound to 18 per cent was
agreed to, with the exception of
"wire" from articles manufactured
of iron or steel, which when galvanized
or coated are to pay an extra
1 cent a pound.

The action of the committee of the
whole in striking out lumber from
the wood schedule, was agreed to, yeas
28, nays 24.

Lathe, shingles, pine clapboards and spruce
boards, struck out in committee of
the whole, were also restored to the
schedule in the bill, the Senate refusing
to agree to the action in committee.

The Senate adjourned.

HOUSE.
WASHINGTON, 12.—Hutchinson
asked unanimous consent for the
passage of the bill for the retirement
of Alfred Pleasanton, with the rank
of Major General. Heede objected.
Unanimous consent was refused.

On the call of States a large
number of bills were introduced and
referred.

Holman introduced a joint resolution
directing the Secretary of the
Interior to issue no more patents for
land to any land grant made until
further action of Congress.

Robertson, of Louisiana, introduced
a bill for the suppression of lotteries
and to prohibit the transmission
through the mails of lottery advertisements.

Guenter reported the joint resolution
for a commission on immigration.

A bill was reported granting a
pension of \$50 per month to the
granddaughter of Thomas Jefferson.

The House refused to consider
District business, and went into
committee on the tariff bill.

On motion of Kelley, debate was
limited to five minutes. Turner's
amendment was lost, Anderson
and Brown voting with the democrats.

Turner moved to reduce the duty
on chains, less than three-eighths of
