LOCAL BRIEFS.

Next Sunday is All Saints' day, and appropriate services will be held in the local Catholic and Episcopal churches.

The remains of N. L. Jacobson, the suicide, were shipped yesterday afternoon, to Bountiful, where the burial will take place.

The regular meeting of the Utah State Poultry association will be held Friday, Nov. 3, at 8 p. m., in the legislative hall, city and county building.

Mrs. Somers-Cocks will give her vocal recital this evening, in the First Congregational church, at 8 p. m.

A testimonial concert in honor of Elder B. A. Burt, who goes shortly on a mission to England, will be given this evening in the Twentieth ward annex.

Grocers from the country say the sheep ranges have become pretty dry, and there is an increasing need of rains or snows to moisten up the winter feed.

Weber county farmers are bringing in Ben Davis apples by the wagon load, and say that this represents the clean-up of their part of the country. The fruit is in good condition.

The fees of the county clerk's office for the month of October amounted to \$2,333.35 as against \$1,977.75 for the same month last year. This shows an increase for October this year of \$355.60.

A reception was given Mr. and Mrs. Edris last evening, in the Plymouth (Congregational) church, when Mrs. Edris was presented with a handsome carving set in appreciation of her efforts in the past in behalf of the church.

Nov. 2nd.

1755—Marie Antoinette consort of Louis XVI of France, born in Vienna; guillotined in Paris Oct. 16, 1793.

1785—James Knox Polk, eleventh president, born; died 1849.

1841—Insurrection of natives at Kulu, India, and massacre of Europeans; Sir Alexander Burns, a Scotch geographer and colonial traveler holding the office of British resident, his brother and other prominent Europeans were murdered.

1882—Lieutenant Frederick G. Schwatka, explorer and explorer, died at Portland, Ore.; born 1849. Lieut. Schwatka's most noted achievement was his successful search for the last John Franklin party.

He found where the ships had been broken up and learned from the natives of the region the story of the great disaster. Many graves of victims were found.

1891—Major Alexander Sharp, U. S. A., retired brother-in-law of General Grant and at one time prominent in Washington military circles, died at the Presidio, California; born 1826.
