SUDDEN DEATH IN CITY JAIL.

Isaac Sloan Found Cold in Death From Apoplexy—Inquest Will be Held.

WEBER COUNTY FAIR AWARDS.

Close Creditable Exhibition—Junction City News—Funeral Services.

Isaac Sloan was found dead on the floor of the city jail yesterday morning when John Snyder made his regular rounds to see how many there were in the jail for breakfast. Death, it is supposed, was caused from apoplexy, superinduced by heavy drink, but a coroner's inquest will be held Tuesday morning to investigate the actual cause of the man's death.

Late Saturday afternoon as Detective Pender was passing down the alley at the rear of Carr's drug store, he saw a man put out of a barber shop with considerable force. Mr. Pender went up to the man and found that he had evidently been struck a heavy blow on the right cheek bone, skinning the cheek and blackening his eye. He staggered badly. The officer asked him where he got the blow, to which he replied, he supposed in the barber shop. His face was bleeding profusely, and the detective decided to take him to the station to sober up. On the way over he became so weak and staggered so badly that a wagon was secured to take him to the station. He gave his name as Isaac Sloan. In his pockets were found \$15 in cash, a silver watch and chain, and a red note book, which had as one of the notes: "I stopped at George E. Ferns on night of Sept. 15. It is supposed George E. Ferns of Huntsville is the man he speaks of. He was put in a cell on the south side of the jail, where he laid down on the bed, but it is supposed, got up to step out of bed of apoplexy, and fell over in an attack of apoplexy, and died almost instantly, as his hands were in his pockets."

Judge Howell was summoned, who, with the following jury, B. G. Knott, James Cassin and Geo. Lucas, and Dr. A. Erickson, viewed the remains, and then had them removed to Larkin & Sons' undertaking parlor, where they will be held in an endeavor to find his relatives. Among his papers were found letters from a Mrs. Egleston of the Humboldt street, Denver, Colorado. From the tone of the letters it is evident the two were considering matrimony.

The deceased is a man fifty-seven years of age, slightly grey, sandy mustache, five foot four in height, weighing about 160 pounds, right big toe off, wore black suit and vest.
