# NIBLEY, OREGON.

CREED HARRIS DEAD. Answers Sudden Summons Through Appoplexy-Was a Native of Virginia.

Nibley, Oregon, Oct. 1.-In a sudden fit of apoplexy Creed Harris died yea-terday. He had partaken of a hearty breakfast, and was working on his threshing machine, having just started up, when he was seen to pitch forward to the ground. He was picked up by those standing near by, but life was gone in a few moments. Deceased was the son of Robert and Elizabeth Vaughan Harris, born May 1, 1846, in Partrick Co., Virginia; baptized July 14, 1896; came to Utah 1899, and settled in Logan, Utab. Later he removed to Oregon and joined the Nibley ward 1901. His death is universally regret-1901 ted, as he was well and favorably known here. .
