Jail Breakers. A dispatch to the Batte Miner dated

Cheyenne, Wyo., July 20th, says:

Six persons escaped from the Alba-ny County jail at Laramie last night Saeriff Sterling and deputy were ab sent on business and the jail was in charge of Turnkey Andy Lang and a "trusty" called Smoky, both of whom w re overpowered by the prisoners and locked in a cell. The liberated prisoners then robbed the sheriff's of fice of its revelvers, two guis. and \$19 cash and lit out for the hills. The shouts of Lang and Smoky finally attracted attention and an alarm was given and vigorous pursuit was insti uted, but without success. At three o'clock this morning mounted meawere dispatched to a circle of ranche

surrounding the town and it is prob-able the prisoners will eventually be captured. Three of the men were serving terms for murder and are hard cases.

Wyoming Jots.

The ground was cleared and work commenced on the new jail and jailor's residence at Evanston last Monday. It will cost about \$12 000.

During the early part of last night, James Courad, one of the prisoners coafined in the jail at this place to await the action of the grand jury, made his escape 'by digging through the floor and down under the founda-tios, coming up between the side of the jail and the well curb.

On Monday evening a badger was brought into town, and a bet was made that Fommy Painter's bull dog could kill the animal in twenty minutes. The wo quadrupeds were turned loose on Front Street, and after gnawing each other until the time was up, the badg-er was allowed to depart, seemingly

unhurt. Last Thursday night, about half past ten o'clock, as Pat Hojt was walking along the sidewalk near Judge Waite's office, some one struck him senseless. He feil in the ditch and after he was down he was struck on the breast. There are several severe bruises about his head and face, and he thinks there must have been more than one who assaulted him. He has no idea who the parties were nor what their object was.
