



LARAMIE, WYOMING. N. S. Lord Meets a Fearful Death in

a Mine Accident. Laramle, Wyo., July 31 .- N. S. Lord was the name of the man who was killed in a shaft at the Sherman hill tunnel last Saturday. The coroner's jury found that Lord came to his death as a result of his own carelessness. Lord suffered a frightful death. He was employed in the shaft that had been sunk in the middle of the long tunnel. He was ascending this long tunnel. He was ascending this shaft in a cage regularly used for that purpose and carried in his arms a bundle of drills ten fect long. These became loosened in his grasp and some of them caught under the timber in the shaft. The cage ascending slowly, Lord was bent over by the drills and forced down upon a bunch that was projecting unward between that was projecting upward between his feet. Two or three of these pene-trated the lower part of his body and mangled him terribly. When the cage finally reached the top of the shaft Lord was so badly burt that he died in two hours. Lord was 56 years of age.

POCATELLO, IDAHO.

Destructive Forest Fires Raging in Shoshone County.

Pocatello, Idaho, Aug. 2.-For the past two weeks destructive forest fires have been raging on government tim-ber lands in the vicinity of Collins postoffice in Shoshone county. Al-ready about sixty acres of very fine timber have been consumed, but what constitutes the greatest cause of glarm is that the flames are approach-ing near the extensive timber selections of the State, C. B.
