## THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Board of Education held a special meeting Thursday night. In the absence of President Baskin, Vice-President Nelson occupied the chair. The members present were Young, Pike, Duke, Newmad, Alf and Baldwin.

## INVITATION EXTENDED.

J. M. Abbott, who represented the Smead Warming and Ventilating company, sent in an invitation to the board to visit places where the system was in use, and consider the advantages claimed for it. Committee on sites and buildings.

## BONDS RECEIVED.

A report was submitted by the clerk stating that the engraved bonds, four hundred and fifty in number, had been received from the American Bank Note Company, of which numbers 1 to 100 inclusive had been signed by the required officers, sealed with the corporate seal of the board and delivered to the treasurer, to forward to the purchasers, George A. Fernald & Company, Boston, Massachusetts. The remaining three hundred and fifty were blank and on deposit with the treasurer. Received and filed.

## BUILDING BIDS.

The committee on sites and buildings reported as follows:

Your committee on sites and buildings report as follows: We opened six bids for the erection of the addition to the Eleventh school, which were as follows:

Each bid was accompanied by a certified check for \$750. Your committee recommend that all the checks be returned to the owners except the one given by William Lister, he being, in our opinion, the lowest responsible bidder; but your committee desire a little more time to examine into the merits of heating and ventilating before recommending any system or entering into a contract for construction of the building.

Mr. Baldwin inquired if the committee did not consider the lowest bidders to be responsible.

Mr. Pike replied, in behalf of the committee, that the lowest bidders had done no work here and were not well known. Mr. Lister was a responsible contractor and was well recommended and as there was only a difference of \$50 in the bids, the contract was awarded to him.

## ASSISTANT MUSIC TEACHER.

The committee on school work recommended that an assistant music teacher be engaged to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Pratt. The recommendation was adopted, and on motion of Trustee Pike it was decided to refer all applications for the position to the committee on teachers.

## ON ACCOUNT OF DIPHTHERIA.

The same committee reported that the janitor of the school in the Exposition building, who lives in the structure, had one of his children taken down with diphtheria, and died. This necessitated the discontinuance of the

school, and would have to remain closed for some days. They, after consultation with the superintendent, decided that the children of this school should be removed to the Tenth ward school, and that half-day sessions be held until the Exposition building could be used again. Adopted.

## JUSTICE—PAST AND PRESENT.

JACKSON, MISS., Feb. 6.—Some seventy years ago, as gray-haired pioneers report, there was in Mississippi a Justice of the Peace who needed no clerk to write him down an ass. He attended to that clerical duty himself. His district was interior and remote from the centres of intelligence. It was far away in the wild woods. No lawyer dwelt in those parts, and the prevalent idea of justice and the modes of administering it were primitive and somewhat arbitrary. There were no railroads, telegraph, or rapid mails to spread intelligence as in these palmy days.
