SUDDEN DEATH
OF BISHOP FERRIN

Prominent and Respected Citizen
succumbs to Bright's Disease
—Ill But One Week.

SEQUESSES IN THE TABERNACLE

Berry Mess Held for Manslaughter—
Preliminary Hearing of the Slayer
of Young Stone.

In the death of Bishop Josiah Marsh Ferrin, which occurred yesterday morning at 8:40 o'clock at his home on 16th Street in this city, Ogden loses one of its best and most highly esteemed citizens, and one who has done much for the upbuilding and beautifying of this part of the state. His demise came very unexpectedly, and brought universal sorrow throughout the entire community. To

since, in 1868 he went on a mission to England, where he spent two years in energetic work, returning home in 1870. He was a member of the territorial legislature, and was elected to Congress Feb. 10, 1856, to Martha A. Bronson, who, with 11 children, 57 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren survive him. The sons and daughters are Josiah L. Ferrin, Eden; Mrs. Martha J. Ballantine, Ogden; James C. Ferrin, Provo; Thaddeus M. Ferrin, Ogden; Morris D. Ferrin, Salt Lake City; George E. All will be able to attend the funeral except Mrs. Sharp.

The funeral services will be held at the Ogden tabernacle Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The remains may be viewed at his late residence, 885 South Sixty-sixth street, on date of funeral, from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Interment will take place in the Ogden City cemetery.

DROWNED IN LOGAN RIVER.

This evening while some boys were fishing in the Logan River in the eastern part of the city, a couple of boys waded out too far and were carried down by the rapid current. One of the boys caught hold of some twigs and managed to regain the shore, but the other, a 10-year-old son of Mr. John Hopkins, was carried down and disappeared in the flood.

The alarm was at once given and a large number of citizens flocked in the search for the lost boy. After two hours' search the body was found down near the county bridge, more than a mile below where he had fallen in. All efforts to restore life proved futile.

The river at this time is very high and too great care cannot be exercised by the boys who resort to it daily to fish or swim.

STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL.

Two Days' Carnival and Merry Making A Grand Success.

Brigham City, Boxelder Co., June 19.—The two days' carnival and strawberry festival was concluded last midnight. It was a thorough success, says the Tribune correspondent, and an event long to be remembered by all who participated in its enjoyment.

The decorations, consisting of red and green, were in evidence everywhere, also the electrical displays. Immediately after the arrival of the train Friday the city was thronged with visitors from all over the state, and quite a number from Idaho were on the road. The county fair was well represented. Strawberries were everywhere in evidence and the entire city presented a beautiful appearance. The program began with the mineral parade, headed by the Bear River band. At the Central school the band and the tabernacle were both on hand and the former had a band of its own, playing strawberries and cream.

At 8 p.m. a matinee at the Opera House was given by the minstrels. The Academy of Music was opened to the public and did much to entertain the vast throng. At the academy square at 2:30 the Wellsville nine and the Brigham field team played a game of baseball and the stadium was large enough to accommodate the visitors. The score was 18 to 5 in favor of Wellsville.

One feature worthy of note was the beautiful concert at the courthouse grounds at 6 p.m. by the Brigham City military band.

In the evening a grand ball was given at the Academy of Music and was a great success. At the Opera House the minstrels gave a pleasing entertainment, which wound up with a dance in the Opera House to those holding tickets to the performance.

The voting for the queen of the carnival closed at noon Friday and resulted in a vote of 3,550 for Miss Lizzie Sherman of Tremont. Miss Eliza Madam of Brigham received over 2,000 votes.

Dancing in the afternoon at the Academy of Music drew large crowds of people.

Saturday the excursion trains were again packed with visitors. The day's attractions opened with a balloon at the academy square between the nine Maughan brothers of Wellsville and the nine Heiner brothers of Morgan, Weber county. The score was 18 to 8 in favor of Wellsville.

Saturday was children's day, and began at 10 a.m. at Central school with games, contests, games, etc. From 1 to 5 p.m. the attractions at the Central school were floral sales, performances such as gipsy grotto, great London mystery, etc. The throngs of children out in summer attire were very pleasing sights. In the afternoon dancing at the Academy of Music drew large crowds.

A match game was played at the Academy square between the Garland and Brigham teams for a silver cup, at 3:30 p.m. The cup went to Brigham.

At 8 p.m. the military band gave another excellent concert at the courthouse.
