

EDUCATION AND JUVENILE COURT

These Two Interests Receive Attention in Bills Passed by State Senate.

TO SUPPRESS THE PEDDLERS.

Important Salesmen Are Given Opportunity to Contribute \$500 Per Year to State Treasury.

The new juvenile court law, drafted to overcome objections recently made to the present law by the supreme court, passed the senate almost unanimously yesterday afternoon. Miller stood out against the provision allowing the governor to appoint juvenile court judges, but found himself alone after a spirited debate.

When Miller had voiced his objection on the grounds that appointment by the governor took a right away from the people, Benner X. Smith took the floor. He said that under ordinary conditions he would favor election by the people. "But in this case," he went on, "I favor having the governor appoint the judges. Not every man is qualified, no matter how good a lawyer he may be. It requires a man who is wise to the children, and one who, in every sense is a father. If we provide that the judges be elected by the people, the office will go into politics and the law only knows what would happen then."

HULANISKI OBJECTS. Hulaniski of Ogden said that there were many reasons why all judges should be elected and many more reasons why they should be appointed. He had had 30 years of experience in public life, and was not aware that any of the basic governmental problems was yet settled. In this case he said the present law was intolerable and needed to be changed very badly. "Under the supreme court decision," he said, "we can do nothing but elect judges to send them to the reform school, he declared.

"Would you have the judges elected?" asked Benner X. Smith. "Decidedly not," was the reply. Senator Butler joined in briefly to inquire about the method of bringing minors into court, and B. X. Smith explained that the process was not a criminal one, but merely one of guardianship. Butler then left the chamber, but all who remained voted for the bill except Miller who remained steadfast in his determination to have the judges elected.

LIGHTNING ROD AGENTS.

An echo of the sixth session was heard when Hellingworth's bill, No. 82, came up for consideration. This was a pet measure of the Ogden senator at that time, and he was then more aggressive in his reforms than he has been this session.

The bill provides a tax for drummers coming in from outside points, whether they sell specialties, clocks, agricultural implements, tools or machinery, carriages, washing machines, books, etc. The tax is 15 cents for each article, but all who remained voted for the bill except Miller who remained steadfast in his determination to have the judges elected.

"Why include lightning rods?" asked B. X. Smith. "There's plenty down our way," suggested Gardner.

"And down our way, too," put in Seely. The country members took delight in this showing the Salt Lake up in his true light. They did the same thing last session to Lawrence when he gravely objected to the word "shot" which was no doubt the word intended. When the farmers finished with Lawrence he was willing to move that the spelling of his own name be changed to resemble his suggestion.

SCHOOL MEASURES.

School teachers and those interested in education should get much pleasure out of yesterday's session. Four bills on education passed the senate. They were Nos. 70, 90, 122 and 185, by Richards, and fortified by a recommendation from the teachers' association. No. 90 is probably the most important, as it aims at uniform courses of study throughout the state, so that

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students from schools far apart will have the higher schools equally prepared. The state board of education is to be composed of the state superintendent, principal of the state normal school, principal of the state normal training school and two county superintendents, and it must meet and prescribe a course of study for all state schools for included in counties of the first and second class.

Bill No. 10 makes county school districts rank as districts of the first class, where an entire county is embraced in a district. Bill No. 5 relates to the issuance of temporary teacher's certificates to people not entitled to life certificates. Bill 122, the part of the series, deals with the duties of county superintendents.

REWARD FOR FARNSWORTH.

For services as assistant attorney general, P. T. Farnsworth was voted the sum of \$2,135. The last legislature in a moment of economy voted against continuing the office by cutting out the appropriation for it, but the officer served on, and the pay came along with the state property, by taxing one man in each company to care for the company's belongings. S. B. 189, by the public health committee, compelling certain health measures to be taken by the names of drugs used in their preparation, was passed, as was also bill 110, by Lawrence, prohibiting the sale of unwholesome foods, and 123, by Watson, on the support of public schools. When the senate adjourned it was until 11 o'clock today.
