



Percentage of Breadwinners Much Greater Among Foreign-born Than Among Native-born Children.

Washington, Jan, 24 .- The extent to which child labor is employed in the United States is set forth in a bulletin issued by the census bureau today. The statistics presented are for 1900 and relate to the employment of chidren as breadwinners, of whom 1,750,000 in round numbers, between the ages of 10 and 16, were so employed. By far the most important occupation for children is that or agricultural laborers, the number of children 10 to 15 years old so

number of children 10 to 15 years old so employed being 1,054,000. Next in importance comes domestic service or the occupation of servants and waiters or waitresses, in which 138,065 children were employed. About one-third of the children em-ployed in gainful occupation were 15 years old, and more than one-half were 14 or 15 years old. The number under 14 was 750,623. Of the total number of child bread-winners from 10 to 15 years old, 72.2 per cent were boys and 27.8 per cent girls.

per cent were boys and 27.8 per cent girls. Almost invariably the percentage of breadwinners is much greater among foreign-born children than among na-tive-born children. The percentage of breadwinners among negro children is much hicker than among much lither that much higher than among white children.

In 1990 the number of cotton mill op-eratives 10 to 15 years old was 44,427. Of the 71,622 messengers and errand and office boys in the United States, 62 per cent were district and telegraph messergers and errand boys, 23.3 per cent were office boys and 14.7 per cent were bundle and cash boys or girls. The occupation of the textile workers or the needle trades furnished employ-ment to 35,070 children between 10 and 15 years old, of whom 5.315 were boys and 29,934 girls. The total number of children 10 to 15 years old engaged in the tobacco and clear factories was 11,-462.

the tobacco and cigar factories was 11,-462. Of the 23,657 children for whom sta-tistics were specifically compiled, the fatherless or not living with fathers, was 4, 943. The percentage of school children in the total population 5 to 9 years of age was 53.8, which is only a little higher than the percentage, 50.6, shown for the selected families incluuded in this study. Of the number of children 10 to 14 years old in these families, only 13.9 per cent were at school, while the corresponding percentage for the total number of children of that age in the United States was 79.8. But after these children reached the age at which the opportunity for employment as wage-earners begins, their school at-tendance suffers.

tendance suffers. Of the total number of children 10 to 14 years of age in the United States, 7.1 were illiterate, as compared with 18.8 per cent for the child breadwinners of the same age, included in this tab-ulation. For the messengers and errand and office boys the per cent of illiter-acy is comparatively small. By far the greatest degree of illiter-acy is that shown for the children in cotton mills.


