The river in Logan canon, especially at this season of the year, runs very rapidly, and being inter-spersed with rocks of all shapes and sizes, renders it very difficult to ford, it requiring a strong person to do so, in order to stem the current of the water, and Mr. Beach being

Mr. Beach was a native of New York State. He came to Utah at an early date, and has lived in Lo-gan for seventeen years past. He was a hardworking, industrious man, as is evident from his constant laboring in the caffon to obtain a livelihood. His remains were interred in Logan Cemetery, Saturday morning, July 21.

Much credit is due to many of

our citizens, on account of their unceasing endeavors to find the body. Between 150 and 200 persons were engaged at once in searching; and the distance between the place where he attempted to cross and the place where he was found was repeatedly examined, without find-ing him, until Friday, July 20, at about 3 p.m., in consequence of the body having a tendency to sink underneath the surface, so much so the difficulty of finding him.
