LOCAL BRIEFS.

Judge Day Has Typhoid—Judge Charles C. Day, the well-known attorney, is very ill at St. Mark's hospital with typhoid fever.

Leaves for Helper—Inspector F. E. Clark of the state board of health, leaves for Helper today to take the practice of Dr. Slopinsky who goes on a hunting expedition.

Dealers Still Behind—The local coal dealers are from two to five weeks behind their orders, and are hoping the present mild weather will continue.

Recovers From Operation—C. E. McLean, who recently underwent an operation at the Holy Cross hospital for the removal of a tumor, has recovered and is up and around again.

Editor Bro. E. Rich to Speak—Editor Bro. E. Rich, president of the Southern States mission, will speak at the regular Sunday services in the Seventeenth ward tomorrow evening. The meeting commences at 6:30 o'clock, and the public is cordially invited to attend.

Firemen Held Up—A. R. Anderson, a short time fireman, was held up Friday morning by two masked men, both of whom drew revolvers on him. The robbers secured \$55 from Anderson and went their way. A fairly good description of the men was given by Anderson to the police, who are now working on the case.

Orchestra Rehearsal Postponed—Owing to the serious illness of Prof. Shepherd's little son, the meeting of the Utah Lake Symphony orchestra set for tomorrow has been postponed. The boy has just passed through a severe attack of the whoopingcough, and was operated on the right side of the throat.

Greyhound Killed—A greyhound belonging to George M. Ottinger was run down and killed at 7:30 last evening, by a sixth avenue car on C street. This makes the fourth dog killed on this line in the last six weeks, and residents claim the speed maintained by the cars is a constant menace to children and elderly persons.
