THE TERRITORY'S VALUATION. Chairman Smith, of the Fiscal Report With Auditor's Report.

Chairman Smith, of the Territorial board of equalization, last evening filed the fiscal report of the total assessed valuation of the territory with the auditor, and gave it at \$97,500,000. Mr. Smith has just completed a report of the taxes which each county will have to pay into the territorial treasury, including general and school. The following amounts will be charged against the counties and not to be paid to the treasury but to the counties.
