Senate.

River and Harbor Bill.

WASHINGTON, 12.—A resolution sub-
mitted to the committee on appropriations
for an amendment to the bill for the
purpose of making appropriations for
completing surveys and estimates
for the improvement of the river and
harbor, was adopted by the committee
and reported to the Senate.

WASHINGTON, D. C., 12.—An ar-
gument was made to-day before the
committee on war claims, favoring the
reimbursement of the citizens of
Frederick, Maryland, for the sum
of \$100,000, expended during the war,
in recognition of the loyalty of the
city.

Coopers on Strike--Tract and
Missionary Meetings.

NEW YORK, 12.—Over two thousand
coopers are now on strike, and the
American Tract and Home
Missionary Societies held their
annual meeting here to-day; officers
were elected; the reports submitted
were favorable to their prosperity
and usefulness.

Doings of the Arkansas Legisla-
ture--More Skirmishing.

LITTLE ROCK, 12.—The legisla-
ture, to-day, appointed a joint
committee to prepare a resolution
concerning the present condition of
the State, to be sent to the President.
A resolution was passed asking
whether Brooks had complied with his
proposition to withdraw his troops
from the State, and leaving the settle-
ment of the difficulties to the legis-
lature.

Another street skirmish occurred
this evening, in which several were
wounded.
