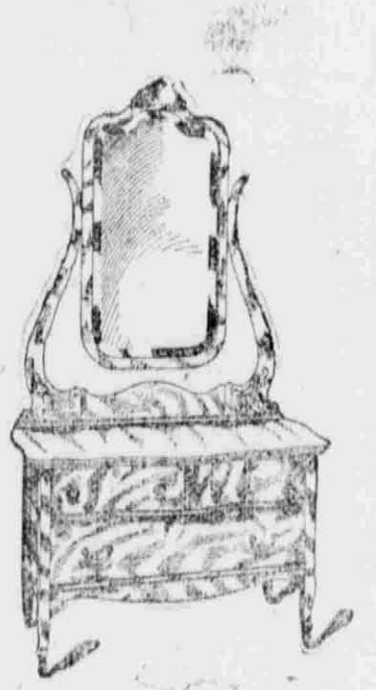
"I am," said the wit, darting quickly by him.
