Flour has advanced during the past few

days, and is now selling at \$16 per hun-

dred pounds. Dealers justify the ad-

vance on the ground that the stock in

hand is light, and that much of their

winter supply is stalled between Cisco,

or some other points westward, and this

city. But, whatever the cause, flour is

high. Beef is traveling rapidly after

the bread, and is selling in quantity to

restaurants at 16 to 18 cents, and in

small lots to families at 18 to 25 cents

per pound. Wood commands readily

\$15 per cord delivered. Candles and coal

oil are high because, it is said, they are
