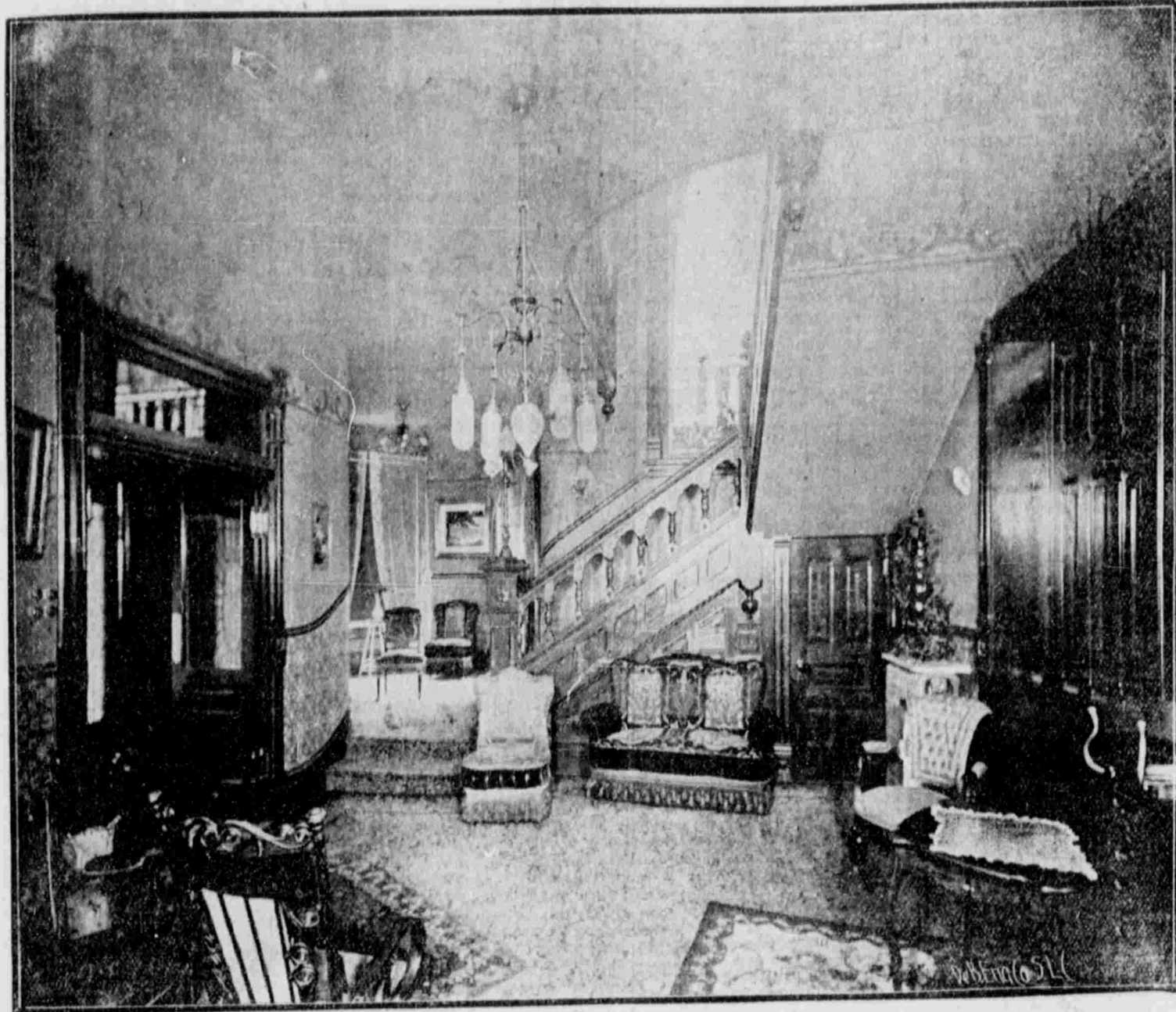

INTERIOR GLIMPSES OF SALT LAKE HOMES.



RECEPTION HALL IN RESIDENCE OF HON. MOSES THATCHER.

One of the handsomest residences in Salt Lake, both in exterior and interior architecture, is that of Hon. Moses Thatcher, situated on the corner of North and West Temple streets. The design outside with its numerous pretty towers and porches presents a pleasing view from any point, and the interior arrangement is no less artistic. The front door on the east leads into a large reception hall and from this two or three steps ascend to a tower alcove on the South, prettily furnished with divan and lounging chairs, and from this a winding staircase leads to the upper floor—a beautiful art glass window set in the side wall lighting the stair and the lower and upper hall with its tinted reflections. On the north of the reception hall is a large parlor handsomely furnished, with old rose tints predominating in upholstery, drap-

ings and tapestries. A cozy triangled nook in the hall west of the parlor, is converted into a toilet with stationary washstand of tinted marble.

A door opens from the west side of the hall into the sitting room and from this folding doors lead into a dining room on the north. The kitchen, which opens on the west from this room, is a model in size and convenience as are the pantry and other accessories of the culinary department. On the upper floor at the head of the stairs is a circular alcove formed by the south-east tower, and from this a wide hall extends the length of the house from east to west with large bedrooms opening on either side, and with bath room and rear staircase at the further end. The convenience and charm of the rooms on both floors are supplemented by the porches upon which windows open from many of the apartments. The entire design and arrangements are among the most artistic and effective of any in the city.
