

VISIT to the Winder farm at A VISIT to the Winder farm at east Thirtcenth South reveals the scrupulous care with which milk is handled now as compared with years ago. Cleanliness seems to be one of the first considerations at the Winder dairy farm. This is seen in and around the stalls in the new barn, which holds order to insure even temperature. 25 tons of hay in its loft. Concrete floors run nearly the whole length of the barn and the drainage is perfect. Among other modern methods introduced is the trolley to remove the refuse, which runs the whole length of the barn to the outside and is very economical in its arrangement. The close proximity of a good flowing well also makes for cleanliness. By means of a hose the floor is washed often and kept in such excellent condition that the visitor is surprised at the absence



By means of the flowing well the milk is cooled as soon as it is drawn from the cow. A room has been built order to insure even temperature in winter and summer the walls have been lined with several inches of saw dust, on the inside of which is lining which is painted.

The floors here are also made of ce-ment and the water tank is also made of same material. As the water is running all the time it is always cool and the buckets of milk are placed in it and cooled quickly. In this room every thing is spotlessly clean and as free from dust as it is possible to make it. The milk from the Jerseys is being
