SPIDER SILK. - Bro. Caleb Luker, who resides at Black Rock, brought us, enclosed in a small box perforated with holes, a species of spider which he caught while cutting wood, north of the point of the west mountain, and about three quarters of a mile up the mountain. His attention was attracted by the spider's web, which was remarkable for its glossiness. He hunted for the spider, and found it snugly esconced in a "nice house of silk"—a cocoon. He took it home, put it in the box, and a few leaves with it; and it spun some silk of a light color, inside of which a large number of eggs are deposited; but from his forgetting to put fresh leaves in the box it died. The box, the silk and defunct spider are now in our office where they can be seen. The subject is worth enquiring into, for by the quantity of eggs in the box the spider must be prolific; and if it should be found to be more easily taken care of and attended than the regular silk worm, it might be mile up the mountain.
