

PROSPECTS FOR SETTLING BUTTE STRIKE ARE GOOD.

Butte, Mont., March 6 .- President Buffy and almost all of the officers of the Butte miners' union were re-elected at the election closing late last night. Prospects for a settlement of the strikes now seem to be bright. There is, however, no change in the newspaper situation.
