EASTERN.

The widow of Foster, who was hanged on Friday last, is utterly prostrated and not expected to live.

A London special says the Right Rev. John Van Sandford, archdeacon of Coventry, is dead. Deceased was the author of *Vox Cordis* and other religious works, and in 1864 was appointed one of her Majesty's commissioners for revising the forms of clerical subscription.

WASHINGTON.—The Secretary of the Treasury has issued an order for and directed the rigid enforcement of the regulation which requires the Treasurer and all assistant treasurers and depositaries of the United States to refuse payment of all official checks of U. S. disbursing officers, if presented more than four months after their issue, and all Treasury drafts and disbursing officers' checks presented more than three years after issue. All checks, the payment of which has been refused, will have to be forwarded to the Secretary of the Treasury for examination and verification.

LOUISVILLE, Ky.—In the suit of M. Lent, vs. Philip Arnold and Robert Slack, for \$350,000, was dismissed to-day, in the U. S. court, by the consent of the parties. The suit grew out of the notorious California diamond swindle. The dismissal was the result of a compromise, Arnold paying Lent \$150,000 cash, each party paying its own cost. The money was paid to Gen. John M. Harlans, Lent's attorney, in greenbacks.

NEW YORK.—Two Brooklyn detectives were in this city to-day, and returned to Brooklyn with a New York man who has had business relations with Chas. Goodrich, murdered there a few nights ago. The coroner, district attorney, detectives and stranger had several consultations during the day. The officials decline to make public the result of their consultations. District attorney Britton said this p. m., "I am pretty well satisfied as to the persons who committed the murder, if we can get hold of them."

ALBANY.—In the Assembly this evening the judiciary committee were instructed to report an amendment to the constitution allowing tax paying females to vote.

NASHVILLE.—Mayor Kercheral has received a letter from the secretary of President Grant, saying that it would be impossible for the President to visit Nashville, as he had been compelled to postpone indefinitely the trip through the Southern States.

PORTLAND, Me.—A new horse disease has appeared. It affects their legs, making them so weak that it is difficult for the animals to stand. No fatal cases.

Henry Ward Beecher says that a poor man with plenty of "cheek" will get along better than a modest man with \$50,000.

Spinning wheels are still in use, and Boston makes thousands of them annually. Nova Scotia takes the most of them.

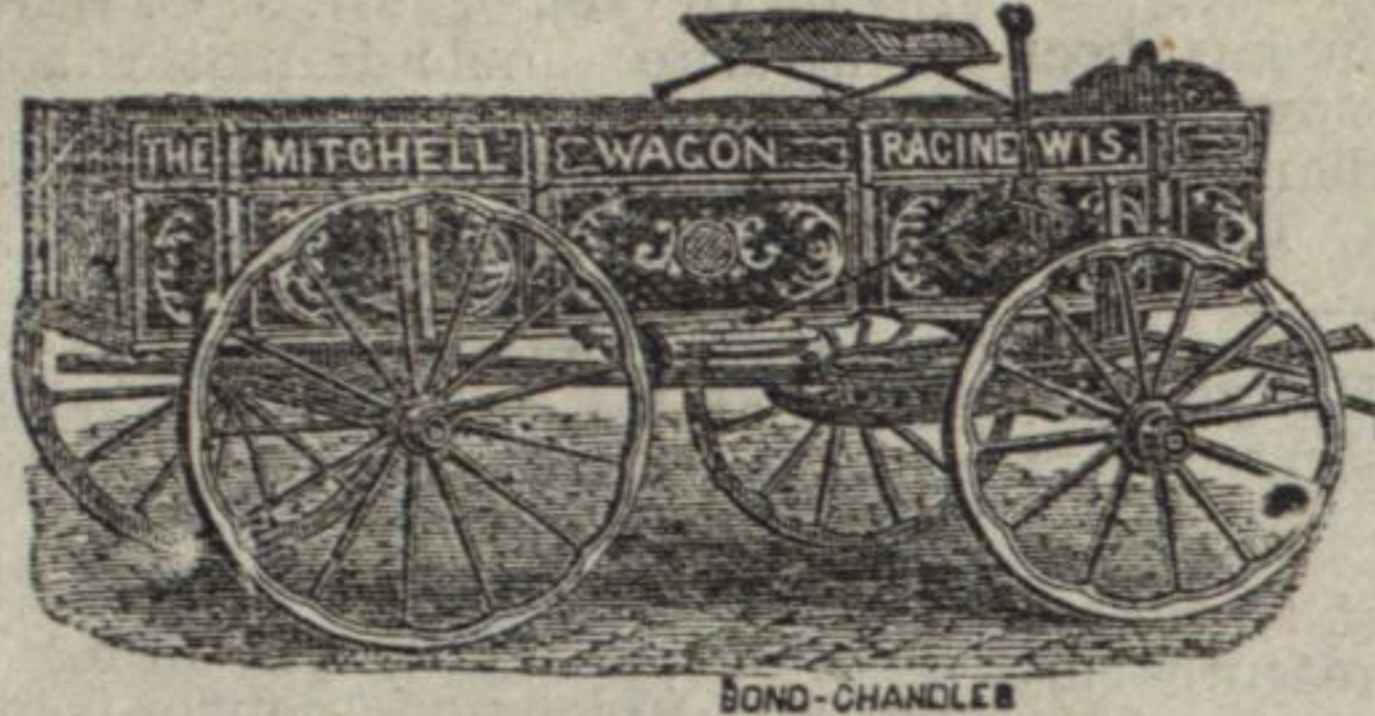

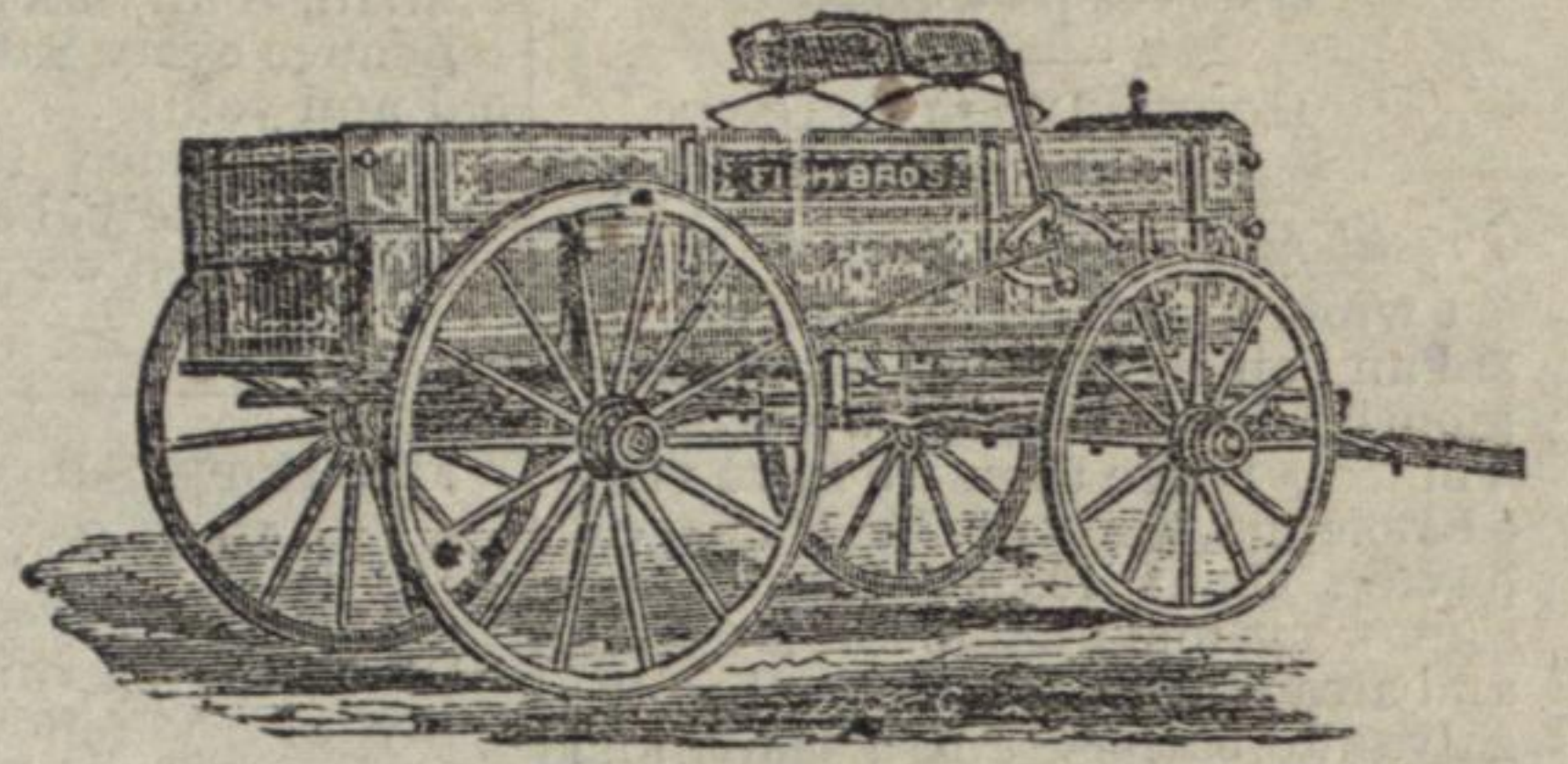
