## IMPROVEMENT OF COUNTY HIGHWAYS

Commissioners Will Reject Offer of Railroad Company—Will Get Material Elsewhere.

## OFFICERS ELECTED BY ELKS.

Frederick Warde Lectures Friday in Tabernacle—Blaze in Methodist Church.

Ogden, Jan. 28.—The inspection made by Commissioners Wm. G. Wilson and Oscar R. Madison of the material offered by the Union Pacific company for \$10 per car to be used for road bed purposes resulted in the commissioners deciding that the offer is not to be accepted. The material offered the commissioners report, is nothing more than river bottom gravel which would be no better than can be obtained anywhere along the beds of the Ogden and Weber rivers here in the county, without any cost other than the getting of the gravel on to the roads. The commissioners have several other offers of material from other places, and these will be investigated if possible between now and Monday so the committee can make its report next Monday to the board. The commissioners hope to be able to secure some suitable material from some of the propositions offered. The roads of the county are in very bad condition and need an expenditure of about \$15,000 to \$20,000 on them during this year, so that the people from the country will not need to come to Ogden through mud axle deep in places as at the present time.

## DANCING IN O'NEILL BLOCK RESTRAINED.

J. P. O'Neill, owner of the four-story block just east of the Reed hotel on Twenty-fifth street, which was built last year at a cost of \$25,000, has commenced a suit in the Second district court against the Fraternal Order of Eagles to restrain them from sub-letting that portion of the building leased by them for lodge uses, to other parties for dancing purposes. The building was inspected some months ago by City Engineer Parker, who pronounced it unsafe for dancing purposes, but since then the Eagles, who occupy the second floor, have continued to dance and hold parties to other organizations for public dances. The Brotherhood of Railway Carmen had rented the hall for tonight, and advertised a dance and card party to be given at the hall. The dance will, however, not be given in the hall, as Mr. O'Neill has secured a temporary restraining order from Judge Howell preventing the use of the hall for that purpose, and he asks that the order be made permanent. Mr. O'Neill claims that the complaint that the building is unsafe for such usage, and that by its being used for dancing the same is greatly damaged, also that he has been unable to lease other parts of the building because of its unsafe condition, when dances are conducted in it.
