We saw yesterday, at the house of James S. Smith & Co., stock brokers, a beautiful and valuable specimen of ore taken the day be-fore from the ninth level of the American Fing mine. This specimen was extracted from a large body of sulpharet ore found in the ninth level, and will assay as high as \$625.18 to the ton. This shows a very marked improvement in the character of the ore, and among those who are beat able to judge correctly this change is looked upon as strong evidence of a radical change in the formation, and as in-dicative of a gratifying improve-ment, indeed showing that another and better quality of ground has been broken into by the company. The vein also runs vertically, instead of at an angle, as before. Six assays of Fing ore from the minth level show average assays of \$240.55.
