

LATEST STORY OF EXPLOSION.

Heroic Conduct of Miners in Effort to Save Their Entombed Companions.

FULL LIST OF THE VICTIMS.

Condition of the Mine and the Effect of the Explosion on Lower Workings.

Special Correspondence.

Diamondville, Wyo., Dec. 3.—There is but little change since yesterday in the condition of things pertaining to the explosion in No. 1 mine. The rescuing parties continue the work of clearing the mine, or rather the slope, putting up brattices at the mouth of the various entries, as they push their way down the slope in their endeavor to reach the entombed men. An extra rope has been put on the engine and some care attached, which will make the work of the rescuers more easy, safe and rapid. The body of Robert Marshall is the only body yet brought out. The rescuers are down to the eleventh level, and know where the bodies of John G. Grimschaw and William Wilson, his partner, are located on the twelfth level. They were breaking off an entry on the twelfth level and the cars were let down to them to load. They rang the trip up just at the time the explosion occurred. The cars are there yet.

Tom Evans who was reported injured, also James Kiddy, it appears, unhurt. Mr. Evans is well known at Ogden and North Ogden. The men had left the mouth of the slope but just a few minutes and were only a few yards away when the explosion occurred, and were thus as it were, miraculously saved. There are no "Mormons" among the entombed men.

WORK RETARDED.

The work of the rescuers is now retarded by some caves-in and the increase of the afternoon. They have to be very cautious now. No naked light is allowed below the eighth level. The rescuing party pushed down to the twelfth level but had to retreat on account of the afternoon. A small fire was found in room four on Eleventh South between two walls of coal, or rather in a crevice in the coal, and only 20 sacks of sand were called for to bury it and put it out.

A reporter of the Denver Post is here and was handled, not gently, for a sensational and extravagant manner in which he gave an account of the explosion. He promises to have it corrected, and was shown through the mine as far as possible, that he might see for himself.

Mr. White, general manager of the C. & C. Coke Company arrived here at noon. Experienced miners are here from Cumberland. Mike Blake, Needham and others.

CONDITION OF THE MINE.

As to the condition of the mine, all of the rock cemented, about 18 inches thick, were blown out, but the roof, which is mostly coal, if not all coal, is in good condition. The track was covered at places with rocks, coal and other material. The overcast was also blown out, near the top of slope. It was repaired, and canvas stoppings put in at the mouth of all the entries, pulled to a wooden frame work, as far down as we went.

A VOICE IS HEARD.

When at about the fourth level lights were seen a way down the slope, and a voice heard. "Quiet, men," shouted Foreman James Hunter. He thought it was some of the entombed men coming out, but was mistaken, as it was the voice of Supt. Sneddon, calling for a man to be sent down. In an instant a young man, Sam Faddis, leaped under the canvas and went down to the mine without any thought of what might be the consequence. Supt. Sneddon, Joe Bird, Walter Morrison and Lindsay Faddis had gone round by way of No. 3 mine and came in below the rescuing party on the sixth level. They made a dash down to the eighth level, where the pump is located, to rescue Robert Marshall, the pump man, but could not find him. Walter Morrison was overcome by the afterdamp and it was all he could do to get out. They all had a good dose of it. Supt. Sneddon came up and reported that he had been around in the man way, etc., and that they were clear all around us, and there was no fire and we need not be afraid, but push forward as fast as we could. Above was the condition of the mine thus far.

SUPT. SNEDDON'S COURAGE.

Supt. Sneddon is a courageous man. He never says go boys until he has gone himself. Talk about courage on the battlefield. No greater courage is known for ever seen than is exhibited by the coal miners. They think not of themselves in times of danger but of others who are in danger.

NAMES OF ENTOMBED.

Report has it that there are 21 men entombed, which is considered official, but don't think there is any more than at first reported. The names of the entombed men are as follows: English—John G. Grimschaw, John Mandley, Thomas Paulds, Henry Greenwood, all single. Scott—John Clark, married, no children. William Wilson, single. Robert Marshall, married, four children. Grimschaw—William Shields, single. Mandley—John Johnson, married, two children. John Kaseet, Gus Johnson, Henry Ustale, all single. Austrians—Lawrence Jenko, married, two children. John Sarnel, Matt Sarnel, brothers, both single.

There are reported to be six Austrians entombed, but the Austrian says there is only three as above given. John G. Grimschaw has his brother's way to America to join him here.

POLAND FREE OF MILITARY RULE.

Abolition of Minor State of Martial Law Was Gazetted Today.

BUSINESS IS DISORGANIZED.

Court-Martial Ordered for the Sebastopol Mutineers—General Strike Urged.

Warsaw, Dec. 5.—The abolition of the minor state of martial law was gazetted today and Poland is now completely freed from military rule.

The authorities have prohibited a proposed meeting of the striking post and telegraph employees. The disorganization of business can be judged by the fact that while before the strike the Warsaw office handled 22,000 telegrams daily, the office now handles only 1,500.

Advices from Sebastopol say that the government has ordered the mutineers to be tried by court-martial in accordance with the procedure in use in wartime.

Information from Moscow says that a committee of the house is trying to arrange a settlement of the telegraph strike.

GENERAL STRIKE URGED.

Warsaw, Dec. 5.—The executive committee of the railroad employees' union telegraphed to all stations of the Russian railroads urging the men to begin a general strike at midnight unless the sentence of death passed by court-martial at Samara on Sokoloff, an engineer, and on other local leaders of the recent railroad strike at Samara is reversed before that hour.

SIX-DAY BICYCLE RACE.

Twelve Teams Out of Sixteen that Started Have Survived Accidents.

New York, Dec. 5.—Twelve teams out of the 16 which had started had survived accidents and exhaustion of the first 20 hours of the six-day bicycle race at Madison Square Garden and still remained in the race when the sun rose today. While 12 of the men rested, the other 12 pedaled around the track with drawn cheeks, cracking lips and eyes, shielded by dark glasses. Throughout the night there were occasional falls, as some tired rider failed to steer his machine accurately, but there were no serious injuries.

The 12 teams left in the race were tied for first position at 9 o'clock, which was the end of the thirty-third hour. They were a fraction more than 85 miles behind the world's record for 24 hours in a six-day race. They were continuously dropping behind the record instead of creeping up. This was partly due to the withdrawal at midnight last night of Charles Vanoni, the Italian rider, who was compelled to drop out because he had no one to ride with. After he left the track the others rode slowly, resting themselves for several hours. The other teams, which have withdrawn from the race are the German-American team, represented by Krebs of Newark and Peterson of Chicago, and the American team, represented by two New York riders, Dove and Scott.

CAMPBELL-BANNERMAN WILL FORM NEW CABINET.

London, Dec. 5.—Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman saw the king at Buckingham palace this morning and accepted the task of forming a new cabinet. The Duke of Devonshire, Liberal Unionist, former lord president of the council, was among the callers on the new premier before the latter went to the palace and in political circles importance is attached to the visit as possibly signifying some kind of working agreement on certain points of policy between the anti-Unionist Unionists, which the duke has been recognized leader since his accession from the Balfour cabinet and the new government.

AMASSADOR MEYER WILL DINE WITH KAISER.

Berlin, Dec. 5.—Mr. Meyer, the American ambassador to Russia, has been invited to dine with Emperor William at Potsdam this evening. The ambassador expects to reach St. Petersburg Friday. He has been getting thoroughly in touch with European politics through his interviews with Foreign Secretary Lavrov, Premier Rogovier and Chancellor von Bulow.

HUNDRED THOUSAND JEWS

Pass Resolutions in Memory of Their Murdered Countrymen.

New York, Dec. 4.—One hundred thousand Jews, each wearing a band of crepe on the left arm, marched under a myriad of black banners through the principal streets of the East Side today, accompanied by bands playing dirges, in memory of the Jews massacred in Russia. Hundreds of women and children, gathered in groups, and bands were scattered throughout the long parade. A procession marched to the Plaza in Union Square, where it resolved itself into a mass meeting to formulate resolutions.

Brief, terse resolutions were read by their leaders to the thousands of paraders. The voting was done orally, with a great show, in which the resolutions were adopted unanimously. After outlining the Russian atrocities and calling upon the United States to interfere in behalf of the Jews, the resolutions continue:
