Remembering the Honorable the

Rocky Mountain Grantees to

be Investigated, &c.

WASHINGTON, 5.—The Chair pre-

sented various memorials of citizens

of Michigan, in favor of a law giv-

ing \$2000 bounty to each Union sol-

dier and sailor, in lieu of a home-

settlement, and for an amendment

to the pension law, so as to grant

pensions to soldiers of the develop-

ment and sailors who were honor-

ably discharged; and that the

homestead law be amended so that

soldiers and sailors who, by the loss

of a limb, or an equal disability,

are prevented from making a

settlement, be entitled to an

amount of money equal to that

which would have been obtained with a settle-

ment, all of which were referred.

Conkling introduced a bill to

amend the act to provide a nation-

al currency, and to provide for the

circulation and redemption there-

of, and to amend the act to provide

for the financial committee. It is a

copy of the bill, by the same title,

reported from the Senate finance

committee April 1, 1875, relating

to national banks in liquidation,

and proceeding to enforce the in-

What General Morrow Thinks about

Army Reduction.

DETROIT, 5.—The Post, to-mor-

row morning will contain a report

of a long interview with General

Morrow on the proposed reduction

of the army. The General thinks

that to reduce the army much below

its present strength would end in

defeat to the service; it would

involve a future large expense from

Indian wars, would leave some of

the territories practically unde-

fended, and by leaving the miners

unprotected would largely reduce

the production of precious metals.

He thinks that, with the present

force, the cost of transportation

could be reduced one half, and other

expenses somewhat cut down; he

favours turning the Indian bureau

over to the war department.
