Mrs. Elmer Peterson came up from Lehi Monday evening and will spend the winter at Koshkiville with her husband.

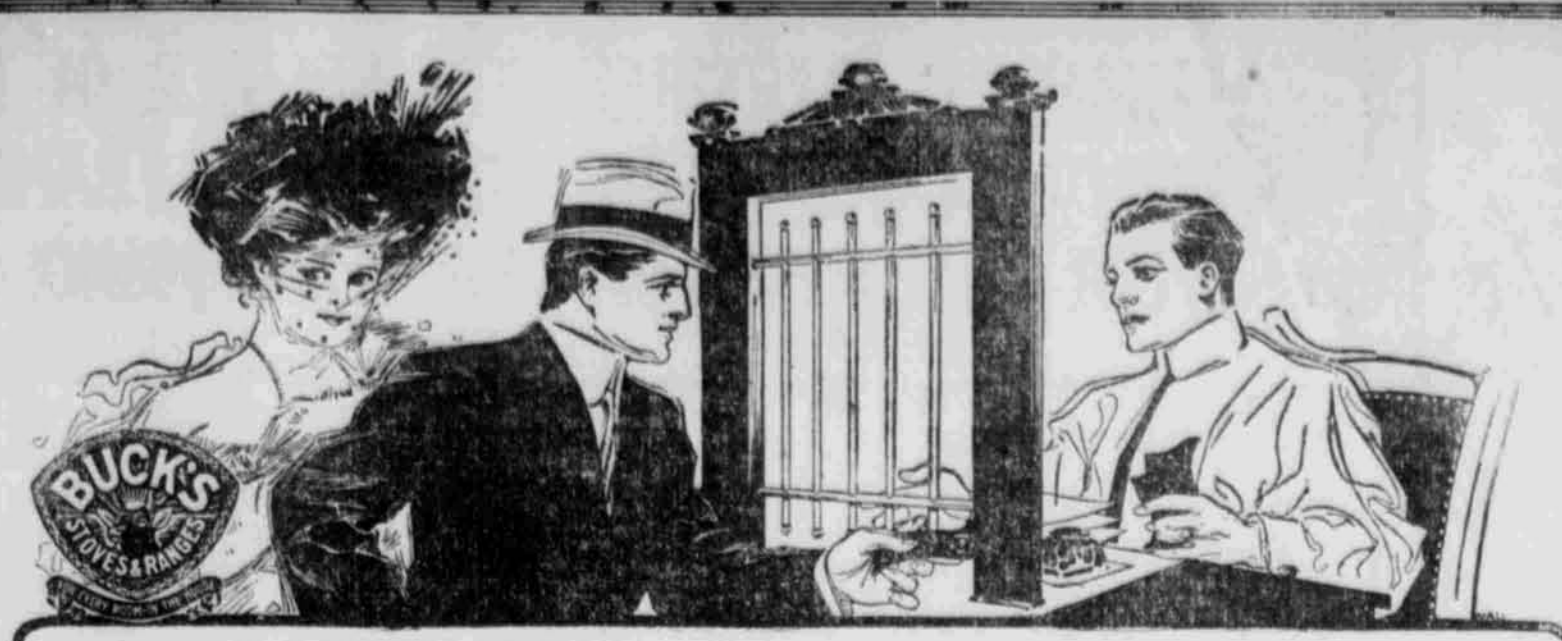
LEHI.
