Today the last of the acts passed by the recent legislature goes into effect, and printed documents bearing the session laws will soon be in the hands of all state and county officers having to may know what changes occur. State Senator Hollingsworth, who was chairman of the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills during the last session has indexed the session laws, and Col. Geo. B. Squires is superintending the work of printing them, under the di-réction of Secretary of State Tingey. Col Squires states that they will be Col Squires states that they will be, ready for distribution within a week. As a commission is at work codifying the laws, it is expected that the session laws will be embodied in their report which will be ready for publication, it is thought, by the end of the present year. Among the new laws are many that

Among the new laws are many that materially alter conditions in Utah. After Monday it will be much more difficult for a man of the Skeen type to operate against county officials, for hedges are built about the opportunities " such a person to molest men in of-ce, unless he can convince others that he is acting in good faith. FOR SPEED MANIACS. For automobiles a very rational speed

For automobiles a very rational speed law goes into effect, framed by Sena-tor Hulaniski, the companion of Hol-lingsworth, who framed the "anti-Skeen" measure, above referred to. An auto-mobile driver must exercise caution, and the court may judge whether he is fravelling at a "reasonable rate of speed" whenever he commits injury to speed whenever he commits injury to property. The meaning of the law as expressed by its author is that when a man endangers only his own neck, he may throw the speed lever open, but when he passes vehicles, goes over crossings, or comes into crowded thoroughfares, he must slow down to a safe speed. fe speed. The university medical school bene-

The university medical school bene-fits from the new laws, for hereafter all unclaimed dead bodies, convicts and paupers are to be turned over for "the advancement of surgical science." For aid farming, an important help is found in a law allowing the state board of land commissioners to make two horings in each county to locate

board of land commissioners to make two borings in each county to locate subterranean waters. Water is abso-lutely essential in dry farming to feed the engine boilers and take care of the cullnary needs of the men employed, but a few buckets a day of it is suffi-cient, and to locate these small amounts in the arid region is the purpose of the new state law

Telephone and telegraph operators are placed under the penalty of a pen-itentiary sentence for divulging in-formation obtained in their official ca-pacities. The transmission of writs, summonses, etc., over the telephone is made legally effective.
