

COLUMBIA WINS THE FIRST RACE

Defender Scores an Emphatic Victory Over the Speedy Boat that Sir Thomas Lipton Brought Over.

Amateur Will Have to Do Better than Today to Carry Off the America's Cup—But the Britisher is a Speedy Boat and Did Well—Columbia's Skipper Shows Superior Seamanship from the Outstart—Gels the Better Position in the Start—The American Yacht Forges Ahead to Windward, and Keeps Her Lead All the Way—When the Wind Blew Hardest, She Did Her Best—Made the Most Pass in the Water—Comes in 10 Minutes, 8 Seconds Ahead.
