

# PLANT GROWTH WAS RAPID.

Generally Speaking Last Week was Very Favorable.

EARLY WHEAT COMING UP.

Orchards are in Full Bloom—Very Little Damage to Fruit Buds—Ranges are Improving.

Salt Lake City, Utah, April 30, 1901.—The Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin No. 3, of the Weather Bureau, Utah Section, for the week ending April 29, 1901:

The week was unusually warm, with the exception of the 26th and 27th, when the temperature was below normal. On the morning of the 27th the temperature was below freezing over the northern and middle sections of the State, and heavy frost formed in a number of localities. On the night of the 26th a good shower fell over Cache, Weber and Morgan counties, but elsewhere no precipitation of any consequence occurred. High winds prevailed, which dried the soil rapidly, and at the close of the week a good rain was expected. The week was a very favorable one for the planting of wheat, and the early wheat was coming up nicely. The planting of sugar beets was practically completed. Fall sown wheat and early corn are in full bloom. The temperature on the morning of the 27th was 40 degrees, and the night was 20 degrees. The ranges are improving, but not nearly as much as they would have done had good showers been general over the State.

St. George, Washington Co.—Considerable wind during the week. Fall sown wheat and barley are doing well. Alfalfa has recovered from the effects of the late frosts and is also doing well.—J. G. Blank.

Toquerville, Washington Co.—The fruit that has escaped the frosts prominent. Plum and cherry are in bloom. Light rain on the 22d.—G. S. Rust.

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# PEACE MEETINGS TO BE HELD.

Mrs. May Wright Sewall Sends Notice to Mrs. Wells.

DEMONSTRATIONS ON MAY 18

Meetings All Over the World to be Simultaneous With the Opening of International Arbitration Court.

Mrs. Emmeline B. Wells, editor of the Woman's Exponent, has received a letter from Mrs. May Wright Sewall, the illustrious president of the International Council of Women, setting forth an outline of a demonstration on May 18th in the interest of peace. These circulars are being sent to every place where peace meetings were held last year, urging a similar meeting with renewed vigor on the date given above.

Mrs. Sewall will visit Salt Lake in June, and the women of the city are preparing to entertain her royally. The circular she enclosed to Mrs. Wells is as follows:

On May 15, 1899, a universal demonstration in behalf of peace was undertaken by an international committee of women. Through the indefatigable labors of this committee numerous meetings were held in fifteen different countries. The chairman of the committee, Frau Marguerite Lecher Selenka, of Munich, reported the results of this demonstration to the conference at The Hague, in its opening session at The Hague, which took place on May 18th of that year.

Notwithstanding the discouraging reports of the intervening years, and the many pessimistic reports of the past, the committee has been prepared, and that the same spirit has been in all other respects complied with the laws of the State of Utah.
