

WAR FAMINE IS THREATENED.

Heavy Shipments in Potatoes from Utah the Cause.

FIVE HUNDRED CAR LOADS

Have Already Been Hauled Out of the State—One Hundred and Fifty for Texas.

Probably there has never before in the history of this state been such a heavy shipment of potatoes to eastern points as is being made at the present time. During the past six weeks it is estimated that the neighborhood of five hundred carloads have been sent out of Utah to Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas, Colorado, too, which is supposed to raise more than enough for its own consumption, has fallen into line and has taken to date fifteen carloads, and the end is not yet in sight.

Speaking of the unprecedented shipments of potatoes out of this state at this time of the year Hoyt Smith, who represents the Colorado & Southern, stated this morning that his road alone had handled over 100 carloads of potatoes for shipment to Texas, while the other lines were doing their share of the business in transporting the produce to adjacent states, where the crop this year had been virtually a failure.

Boston & Albany Changes Hands.

New York, Nov. 1.—November 1st is the date finally set by the New York Central for taking possession of the Boston and Albany railroad, says a dispatch to the Times from Boston. The assertion is made upon authority that the officers of the Boston and Albany are to remain at Boston. Shipments of Citrus Fruits.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 1.—During the citrus season of 1900, which closed last night, 17,321 cars of citrus fruits were shipped from southern California, of which about 2,000 were lemons. By November 15th the movement of the new crop will have fairly begun and probably 4,000 cars will be shipped East for the holiday trade. The output for the holiday season is estimated at over 20,000 carloads.

Paris Adheres to Integrity Principle

Paris, Nov. 1.—The Politique Coloniale makes the following announcement: "The French ambassador to Great Britain (Paul Cambon) has received instructions to reply to the Anglo-German agreement that France adheres to the principle of the integrity of the Chinese empire and the open door, and that with regard to article 3 she reserves the right to act in such a manner as to safeguard her interests."
