

## HOME ITEMS.

**THE NEW GOVERNOR.**—His Excellency Chas. Burke, Governor of Utah, arrived in this City on Saturday 30th ult., by private conveyance. On Tuesday evening, 3d inst., he was serenaded by Professor Thomas' Brass Band, when Hon. W. H. Hooper introduced the Governor to the people assembled, who briefly addressed them.

After intimating that he was not a speech-maker, he expressed his pleasure at responding to their kindness and courtesy. He had come here to perform the duties involved in his office according to the best of his abilities, how far he would be able to perform them to the satisfaction of the people and the Government the future would show. He was astonished at the great things that had been done here, yet there are important interests to develop, and he was desirous of co-operating with the people in developing them. He hoped, further, to co-operate with the people in advancing moral, intellectual and educational interests. He expressed himself a great believer in the doctrine of progress, and was in favor of advancing the interests of the country, not by force but by argument, by the freedom of the press, by debate, schools and just laws. He observed that if we enact laws we should observe them—if they are right framed, if they are not we should repeal or amend them. His concluding words were, "If I fail in giving satisfaction in the discharge of my high duties as Chief Executive, I shall be willing to take my humble sphere as a citizen among you. I hope our acquaintance will be extended and be satisfactory to me, to you and the country. Mr. Head, of Wisconsin who had arrived with Governor Durkee, Mr. Secretary Reed, Mr. Bruce of Montana, Col. O. H. Irish and Hon. W. H. Hooper respectively delivered short addresses.

**WELCOME HOME.**—Pres. D. H. Wells, lady and child and Elder F. C. Free, arrived on the 7th inst. by stage, having reached Denver on the 30th ult., and left there on the 2d inst. The friends of Pres. Wells, and their name is legion, will be pleased to learn that he is well, and comes home in the enjoyment of excellent spirits. Professor Thomas' and the Ogden brass bands were serenading him as the people were assembling for morning meeting in the Bowery.

**BACK FROM THE SOUTH.**—President B. Young and company got back from the Southern settlements on Friday evening, 29th ult. The demonstrations of welcome on his return were spontaneous and hearty. A mounted escort met the company 10 miles from the city; the bands gave a volume of musical greeting, numerous citizens in carriages, on horseback and on foot lined the State Road for some distance, and an unusual display of "bunting," including a mammoth specimen of the Stars and Stripes hung across the State Road, gave evidence of the general welcome. The trip was one of great pleasure to those visiting and of much interest and profit to the settlements visited. Everywhere on the journey the most hearty enthusiasm was manifested by the people.

**ADVANCING.**—Hon. W. H. Hooper has been adding twenty feet to the front of his buildings, occupied as stores, on the east side of Main street, and the addition, graceful and tasteful with a couple of new stores, will add much to the appearance of that portion of the street. That occupied by Bodenbush & Kahn is finished, roomy and airy, "neat but not gaudy" inside, with a very pretty frontage. Coming out seems to be the rage on that side of the street. Big stores and little stores are throwing out their advance works and forming line with regularity and quickness. It all tends to build up and beautify. **HELP FOR THE IMMIGRATION.**—Elder T. Taylor left on Monday, 2d inst., to assist the incoming immigrants.
