Mr. Geoghe-gan stated today that their errand was largely of a private character and nothing was done in which the public had

interest. Mr. Cutler states that the operations at Lehi and Springville have now ceased, and while about fifty men are employed at Lehi making raw sugar, they will all be discharged in a few days and the factory closed up for the winter. The last white sugar was turned out yesterday, the total pounds sacked being 11,280,609. The total of beets cut was 50,423 tons. The sugar figures above do not represent the total output, as there will be quite an amount of raw sugar carried over.

GREAT POWER COMBINATION

#### Telluride Company Will Have 11,000 Horse Power and 200+Mile Line.

It is announced that the Telluride Power and Transmission company of Utah is about to effect the longest unbroken electric power line in the world. It will be from Logan to Bingham and Provo, a distance of 200 miles. This will be accomplished by the putting of a new 3.000 horse power plant in Logan canyon, and also one at the mouth of Provo canyon with \$,000 horse power. The present station in Provo canyon has only 2.500 horse power. This will give the company a combined capacity of 11,000 horse power, as against 4.500, the power that it now has.
